NANCY GARRETT is not only a super skier but since introducing her delightful Cook's Corner in TOOT is now the de facto chief chef in a club noted for talented cooks. She is also an experienced hiker adding merriment to many a PVS climb which she says she goes on to lose pounds enough to enable her to properly conduct her cooking

and sampling duties.

Born in Tennessee and raised in Alabama, Nancy graduated from Auburn University where she met future husband Ray when both were freshmen. After graduation they married and eventually migrated to Washington (Ray with the FAA) where, except for a 3 year assignment in Chicago, they have been ever since. They live in Burke, Va. Two sons, one married, live nearby. After 7 years working in the Department of the Army, Nancy changed jobs last year and works now in the Budget Office of the FAA.

The family's first skiing experience was at Seven Springs in 1973. Says Nancy, "The instructor took us to the top of a blue trail, taught us to snow-plow and then left us. Three hours later, Number 2 Son and I made it to the bottom of the mountain - totally disinterested in ever skiing again." However, the next day they gave it "one more try" and soon it was old familiar story: the whole

family was hopelessly addicted.

Ray and Nancy first skied with PVS in 1982 with the Marxes. Janet is a sorority sister and persuaded Nancy to join the club. Hooray for Jan!

Nancy says her most memorable ski experience was during a heavy snow storm at Alta. "We had never before skied deep powder so Dick Clark took Ray and me all over the mountain as snow continued to fall. Such fun! Especially with Dick as teacher and guide!

Nancy can't name a favorite ski area. Actually, most any place she skis becomes notable because she herself brings so much joie to the sport.

BARBARA LEONHARDT is another PVSer noted for her culinary gifts as well as skiing expertise. In both fields she is exceptionally talented astonishing fellow skiers with her grace and speed on the slopes and delighting them with homemade goodies from her kitchen.

Born and raised in Buffalo, N.Y. Barbara worked as a chemist for Union Carbide for 10 years while simultaneously earning a BS at SUNY night school in Buffalo.

In 1966 Barbara came to Washington to work as a chemist in the Department of Agriculture's Research Center in Beltsville, Md. At the same time, she worked to earn a PhD in chemistry from American University - making 17 years in college, all but two of them part time. Currently she is at work investigating insect pheromones - a scientific word for what makes boy bugs like girl bugs and in humans used to be called "It."

On a SCWDC trip to Davos and St Anton Barbara met Fred, turned

on the old pheromones or whatever and married him in 1978.

Barbara had been active in SCWDC and was a Qualified Amateur Ski Instructor but after a trip to Austria with the Wyckoffs in 1982 the Leonhardts joined PVS giving us yet another reason to thank the Wyckoffs and to lord it over that other club!

Barbara's most memorable ski experience was spending a day helicopter skiing in deep virgin powder near Snowbird, Utah. Her favorite ski areas are Snowmass at Aspen and Beaver Creek at Vail.

Chief Leonhardt hobbies, besides skiing and travelling, are home improvement and gardening - skills amply demonstrated in their Potomac. Mamland home, the scene of many club meetings in the past. And, we hope, in the future!

Now a retired colonel, Knox has ample time for his many outdoor interests. An ardent hiker, he is an experienced mountaineer. A couple of years ago he refreshed his skills in rock and ice climbing by attending Armed Force classes in Garmisch, Germany.

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COOK'S CORNER

"COOKIN' COUPLES!!!!!"
Or, should that be
"COUPLES THAT COOK!!!"???
Oh, well - - -

Either phrase will fit the couple whose recipes are featured in this edition. The WALNS "cook" in lots of ways and most certainly, one is in the kitchen. These two provided dinner for the crew at WISP, and what a tasty dinner it was. Not a choice, but a large bit of both of JANET'S LASAGNA and CHRIS' SICILIAN CHICKEN & PASTA. According to Chris, Sicilians never met an oregano, and the sauce is a mild complement to the chicken.

SICILIAN CHICKEN AND PASTA

Freeze until nearly solid:

- 1 deboned chicken breast, per adult Slice across grain to 1/8"-1/16" thick. Grate or shred:

- 13 inch yellow onion, per adult
- 1 shallot, per adult

In 2-3 Tablespoons olive oil, saute onions until soft. Add chicken and

- l Tablespoon chili powder, per adult
- 3/4 teaspoon cumin, per adult

Cover skillet and steam 15-20 minutes.

Add:

- 1/2 small can tomato paste, per adult
- 1/2 small can tomato sauce, per adult
- 1 teaspoon sugar, per adult (to taste)

Reduce heat and cook until onions are no longer visible, approximately 30 minutes.

Serve on favorite pasta - linguine, fettucine, or rigatoni.

While above ingredients are "per adult", the adults would have to be VERY hungry when this dish is served with Janet's Lasanga and garlic bread.

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JANET'S LASAGNA

In medium bowl, beat together and set aside:

- 2 16-oz. containers Ricotta cheese
- 6 eggs, added one at a time

Brown in large pan:

- 2 lbs. ground round
- 1 lb. pork sausage

Add:

- 6 chopped scallions
- 3 medium yellow onions
- 2 teaspoons oregano
- 2 teaspoons thyme
- 3 teaspoons Italian seasoning
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- 4 small cans tomato paste
- 4 small cans tomato sauce
- 1 16-oz, can stewed tomatoes
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Combine well. Cover and simmer on low for at least 45 minutes, stirring often.

Cook according to package directions, drain well, and set aside:

- 1 10-oz. package frozen chopped spinach
- 1 16-oz. box lasagna noodles

Open 3 long packages of Mozarella cheese.

Using two 12" X 9" X 3" pans, layer ingredients three times, as follows: Sauce, lasagna noodles, Ricotta mixture, and Mozarella cheese. Between second layer lasagna and Ricotta, spread cooked spinach. Top final layer of Mozarella with a mixture of chopped parsley and Parmesan cheese.

Bake covered with foil for 45 minutes in 350° oven. Uncover and cook for 20 minutes more or until top is lightly browned and bubbly. JUST DELICIOUS!!!

These treats were served with hot garlic bread and a spinach salad with Lemon-Herb dressing.

LEMON HERB DRESSING

In one-pint container, mix together:

- 1 package Good Seasons Lemon Herb Mix
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 2 Tablespoons water
- -2/3 cup oil
- 1-2 teaspoons sugar

Getting There is Half the Fun by Jim Slack & Mary Ward

PVSers took many different routes to join Bob & Margaret Wyckoff's Swiss ski adventure: Paddy and Shirley Frucht from New Mexico, Joe and Nancy Lewis from London, Jim Slack and Mary Ward from California, and Ray McKinley from Washington but via a different route. The group still wasn't complete until we arrived in Interlaken where we joined Kirk Burns, who had already checked out the slopes, and Nick and Charlotte Von Bomhard, Charlotte Eddy's daughter and son-in-law, from Munich.

Once the clan had gathered, we found that the snow spirits had been kind to us. A couple of weeks of recent snowfall had made it possible for practically all of the runs at the neighborhood's three ski areas to be open, at least when the winds weren't howling like a banshee. We had expected much worse conditions during this warm and dry European winter.

About half of us took it easy the first day and made the acquaintance of the cog railways that would take us between ski areas. There are four separate rail systems serving the area, not counting the trams, gondolas, funiculars, T-bars, and Europe's oldest, longest, and most unusual (you sit facing sideways!) chair lift. There is also a ski bus.

The weather proved to be variable during our stay in Interlaken. By the end of the week, much of the new snow had surrendered to the high winds. And clouds intermittently obscured the surrounding mountains as well as the sun. Nevertheless there was a lot to do besides ski: explore local sites, ride the trains, visit other towns (on the train), and ride the train to the highest train station in Europe -- the Jungfraujoch.

After our week in Interlaken, we waved good-bye to the Von Bomhards (sadly) and the cog railways (not so sadly) and boarded a bus to Saas Fee, our next destination. The route included a trip through a mountain tunnel on, you guessed it, another train. Our bus was loaded onto a flat car along with other busses and cars for a short ride through the Loetschberg tunnel.


Saas Fee had no trains (except the world's highest subway) and plenty of snow. There was snow there already, we arrived in the snow, and it snowed all the next day. Many of our group sat out that first day. Ray McKinley wished he had. In the poor visibility he had an accident that has sidelined him for a while. The rest of the group flew to Paris.

Early Monday morning most of the group left on the final journey home. Alice Swalm, Jack Hadler, Jim Slack, and Mary Ward, who remained for longer stays in Paris, waved them goodbye.
