## BLACK, BLACK, BLACK RUN -

The Ski Club of Great Britain has listed the twelve "most challenging black runs in, Europe. One of those listed is Galzig/ Valluga in St Anton. Here is a description, in case any of Gorman Young's group wants to try it.

Riding up the Galzigbaha cablecar in St. Anton you glide over the black Osthang. Ht looks are deceptive starting harmlessiy enough on the groomed blue Osthang, at the bottom of which you drop off the edge down the black run. This run cuts a steep narow path down through the fir trees where you should get your turns in. Hyou're first down in fresh powder there's a glorious pitch down the fall line with a vicious compression of two to throw you off balance. Stay upright and you rejoin the bue nu in no time at an. In contrast, the vast Schindlerkar is an inmense area with an infinite choice of rovtes down over a thousand vertical metres - a giant mogul field which can be reached from the top of the Schindlergratbahn or by schussing from the Vallugabahn. A high traverse left to beneath the ridge of rocks provides a long fall line pitch, though it is only one of many ways down this leviatitan run.

Near the bottom, expert skiers continue down steep gullies which peter out into nothing. Most skiers follow the netted path right and circurnavaigate the sheer rock cliff. Then there's a challenging gully down into Happy Valley where you come across more gentle meadows that lead back to the chair.
