COOK'S CORNER *

In January I promised you Kathy Quindén's recipe for chicken enchiladas. It is presented this month. If

you plan to have a Valentine's party, the recipe for Veggie Pizza from Irene Farrell could be easily adapted to blend in with the red and white decorations.

CHICKEN ENCHILADAS Kathy Quinden

Have all ingredients close at hand so that assembling is easy. You will need :

- 1 dozen fresh corn tortillas
- Oil to cover skillet to 1/2-inch
- 3 cups cooked chicken or turkey, cubed
- 1 cup grated longhorn cheese for top of casserole
- 1 recipe chicken filling sauce
- 1 recipe green sauce
- 1 9" X 11" flat casserole

Sauce for Chicken Filling:

- Mix together:
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup grated longhorn cheese
- 1 medium onion, chopped

Green Enchilada Sauce:

Saute until clear, not brown: - 1 Tablespoon oil

- ½ cup chopped onion

Add and mix well: - 2 Tablespoons flour

Add and simmer for 15 minutes: - 2 (4 oz.) cans chopped green chilies

- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 (16 oz.) can tomatoes
- 1 cup chicken broth

Makes about 1½ pints of sauce.

Enchiladas are much easier to assemble if meat and sauces are cool.

In heavy frying pan, heat oil to about ½-inch deep. Fry tortillas, one at a time, just until soft. Place tortilla in center of casserole dish. Place a small amount of chicken, cheese sauce, and a spoonful of green sauce. Roll tortilla up and place flap down in casserole.

Repeat process until all ingredients are used, being careful not to crowd the enchiladas too much in the casserole. Pour the remaining sauces over the enchiladas and sprinkle with grated longhorn. Bake at 350 until bubbly (about 20 minutes). Serves 4 to 6.

VEGGIE PIZZA Irene Farrell

Press onto cookie sheet and prick: - 2 (8 oz.) packages crescent rolls

Bake at 350° 10-12 minutes. Cool.

Mix together and spread on cooled crust:

- 2 packages (8 oz.) cream cheese
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 package ranch style dressing

Cut into squares and decorate tops with: - Shredded cheddar cheese

- Radish slices
- Chopped carrots or Carrot curls
- Cauliflower bits
- Broccoli bits
- Chopped green onions

<u>CHICKEN LIVER PATE</u> Nancy Garrett

Rinse 1 lb. chicken livers in cold water. Drain. Remove and discard membrane or fat.

In a large skillet, saute: - ½ cup (1 stick) butter or oleo - ½ medium onion, chopped

Add, continuing to stir:

- Cleaned chicken livers
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- ½ teaspoon tarragon
- { teaspoon thyme
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Dash nutmeg and cinnamon

Cook until livers are firm and pink in the center . Do not overcook. Pour mixture into food processor and blend until smooth. While blending, add: - 4 Tablespoons cream sherry

Put mixture in lightly greased 2-cup mold. Chill. When solid, unmold onto serving plate. Garnish with parsley. Serve with crackers or toast.

PROFILE


BILL HAGER , a nominee for election to the Executive Committee in April, has been a member of the club for more than 20 years and has previously served on ExCom. When asked to give a biographical sketch for TOOT, Bill sent a profile from which we have taken the following extracts:

"I was born and grew up in Southern California where water skiing was much more popular than the snow variety. I attended Loyola University of Los Angeles, majoring in Political Science. To avoid the draft, I joined the army and, after a year of Korean language training, spent the next year and a half in Korea. Before returning to the U.S., I spent an unforgetable month hitchhiking on military aircraft to various areas in the far east.

"The experience eventually led me to join the State Department, which sent me to a variety of garden spots around the globe but mostly in tropical countries where there was not a lot of skiing.

"I returned from Paris in 1971, having learned to ski the previous winter at Verbier that season it made New England boilerplate look like packed powder, and ever since, I've had a fondness for sheet ice! I visited the Washington Ski Show where PVS had a booth, was beguiled by the charms of Gail, Marilyn and Jan, and opted for PVS over SCWDC and the Fagowees. I've skied Mt Sutton almost as many times as has Jack Peoples, back when we carpooled in family groups and stayed in assorted chalets and Jay Peak was included in the 6-mountain lift ticket package.

⁴⁷ Killington was a favorite New England destination in the early days, with long drives and inexpensive family accommodations some distance from the slopes - but those can be the most fun, and we always had great hosts. Colorado was the destination in 1978: Crested Butte and Aspen - I'll never forget flying one early morning from Crested Butte to Aspen in a three passenger plane, with the sun just coming up over the mountains, and skimming so low over the peaks you could reach out and touch the snow! It was a long, dry spell then, until returning home in 1989 and skiing, in succession, Mt. Sutton, Val d'Isere and Courmayeur, and Steamboat. There are so many memories here of special slopes and incredible runs when everything came together. But perhaps the Vallee Blanche, between Italy and France, highlights the ski experience for me."



SENIOR AIRLINE DISCOUNT-COUPON BOOKS BY CHARLES W. HUGGINS

All U.S. airlines continue the 62 minimum age, and coupons are good for one year of travel. TWA has some blackout dates, and Delta, USAir, Northwest, and United limit the number of seats available per flight. Northwest and United have lower-priced coupons that restrict travel days and higher-priced ones without restrictions. United has travel restrictions on Friday, Sunday, and Monday. Continental and Delta allow standby travel, but all airlines require that reservations be made 14 days in advance. All but Continental had price increases on Jan. 15th.
