
Elections will be held at the Annual business meeting in April. Additional nominations may be made by the signed proposal of any five active members presented one month prior to the April meeting.

The following are requirements for membership in PVS. If you are sponsoring an applicant, you should see to it that the applicant fulfills the following:

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- 1. Be invited and sponsored by a member in good standing.
- Submit a written application for membership with a check.
- 3. a. Attend at least 3 club meetings or events.
 - b. Ski at least three days with a club member.
 - c. Pass the USA Uniform Basic Ski test or display equivalent skill.
- 4. Be approved by vote of the membership at the Annual Meeting in April, provided however that 5 or more negative votes shall be sufficient to bar an applicant from membership in the club.

Following are bio's of nominees for the Executive Committee:

Tack Ragen, an Ohio native, grew up in Toledo, not far from the restaurant made famous by Klinger of MASH, Tony Packo's Cafe. Life in Toledo was tranquil and ski slopes were nonexistent.

He has the Navy to thank for introducing him to the field of radar and electronics. After graduation from the University of Ohio, he became a research engineer with General Electric and AVCO doing everything from color television, communication and radar systems. Fairchild brought him to the Washington area to work in their design engineering division on aircraft, satellites and missiles.

Jack (at age 70) decided to try skiing after listening to three PVSers rave endlessly about the sport. Being good friends, they took him to Ski Liberty on a day when the blue ice was disguised by one inch of snow. (Bob McNeill, don't tell us this doesn't happen at Liberty). Undaunted, he tried several other slopes then headed for Steamboat in 1996, but his ticker told him "not this year." But after a few more lessons and a little gluhwein, look out!

Jack is an amateur radio enthusiast, but like most PVSers he loves the outdoors - fishing, canoeing, golf, tennis, hiking, biking and cross-country skiing.



BOB MARX - Bob was born in Chicago, IL, but was raised from the age of 11 months in Minneapolis, MN. It was there, while in high school, that he started skiing using the hills on a nearby golf course, some inherited wooden Northland skis (the kind that had a ridge along much of the top) with bear trap bindings, and hiking boots. After entering the University of Minnesota, he graduated to skiing at local ski areas (Buck Hill had a vertical drop of 186 feet, and Mount Telemark had a whopping 293 vertical feet). He also upgraded his skis by adding cable bindings (with long-thongs), metal edges (they came in about 8" interlocking sections with four screws per section — whew!) and a plastic base (it came as a liquid in a can and was painted on) to those old Northland skis. He also got wonderful lace-up boots.

With these upgrades complete, he made his first trip to Colorado (1962) with the University ski club (in which he later met Janet). After an all night drive from Minneapolis, he and the crew emerged in the Loveland parking lot at about 8:15 a.m., got into their ski gear, and had a delightful day skiing above 10,000 feet. What a difference from those Minnesota mole-hills! The rest is history. He made several more Colorado. Utah, and Canada ski trips, graduated (with a degree in Geography), married Janet, moved to the Washington, DC area (1966) to work for the Census Bureau. and joined PVS (1968) --sponsored by Pat Calef (Cope), Carol Parmenter, and Aina Hertelis (Thomas) -- after passing the USEASA Basic Test at Wisp, as administered by Larry Pease. He has served the club as co-meeting host, co-trip leader, corporation rep, Ex Com member, Vice President, President, and Past President.
