COOK'S CORNER

The only thing missing at the Waln's luau was the beach. The atmosphere was rife with palm trees.

Hawaiian music, even a parrot and of course, wonderful food. Chris and Janet are sharing several of their recipes.

PARADISE RUM PUNCH

For I gallon of plain punch, mix together:

- 2 (12 oz.) cans Dole Paradise Frozen Fruit Drink (Pingapple, Orange, Guava)
- 8 cans cold water

For I gallon of spiked punch, mix:

- 2 (12 oz.) cans of Dole Fruit Drink
- 7 cans cold water
- 3 cups dark rum

3 gallons of spiked and 1 gallon of plain will serve 29 thirsty people at a luau.

OVEN KAHLUA PORK

Oven Kalua Pork is a convenient substitute for pig from the 'imu (pit dug in the ground).

Preheat oven to 5000.

Have the butcher debone:

 16 pounds boneless pork loin cut into 2 8-lb. roasts

Rub into pork:

- 8-10 Tablespoons coarse Kosher salt
- 10-12 Tablespoons Liquid Smoke

Using $2\frac{1}{4}$ - 3 pounds of fresh, washed and drained spinach leaves, wrap each pork roast in spinach leaves and then in heavy aluminum foil. Bake in covered pan for 45 minutes. Reduce temperature to 3250 and cook for $6\frac{1}{4}$ - 7 hours. Shred into pieces and serve with a little of the pork juices.

This is wonderful served with Hawaiian rolls. It is very salty.

APRICOT CHICKEN

Sauce for marinade:

In blender bowl or food processor, purée:

- 1 (14 oz.) can apricots with syrup

Add and continue to puree:

 2 Tablespoons olive oil vinaigrette salad dressing

- 2 Tablespoons light soy sauce

- ½ teaspoon garlic powder

 1 teaspoon ginger (or 1 piece fresh ginger root, peeled and minced)

pinch of dried tarragon

- pinch salt and ground pepper

Reserve one-third of mixture and refrigerate. In remaining mixture, marinate over night:

 2 packages boneless, skinless chicken breasts (4 whole, 8 halves) cut into large chunks

Next day:

Skewer chicken chunks onto 8 skewers. Bring reserved apricot mixture to boil, stirring for 2-3 minutes, then simmer. Brush grill with vegetable oil when coals are hot and grill skewered chicken for approximately 15-20 minutes. Remove from grill. Brush chicken with boiled apricot mixture and garnish with toasted almonds. Serves 4-6 as a main course.

INDONESIAN STEAK SATAY

<u>Marinade</u>:

Mix together well:

- ½ cup chunky (or smooth) peanut butter

- ½ cup light soy sauce

- 4 cup lemon juice (fresh is best)

- 4 cup brown sugar

- ½ teaspoon hot pepper sauce (or less)
- 1½ teaspoons garlic powder

Marinate overnight in refrigerator:

 2 lbs. sliced sirloin steak (trimmed of all visible fat)

Next day, thread onto bamboo skewers and grill 3-6 minutes, turning once. Serves 8 - 10.

A large serving of satay over rice can be a light meal when accompanied by salad and bread. Marinade will keep in refrigerator for several days.

PROFILES

PVS IS A SMALL CLUB AND WE THOUGHT IT WOULD BE NICE TO GET TO KNOW OUR fellow-skiers better. Each year we print profiles of new club officers and now Howard Hensley has undertaken to solicit biographical material from all of us. Shirley Rettig and Kathy Quinden responded with the following profiles. Others will appear in subsequent issues. PLEASE COOPERATE!!

SHIRLEY RETTIG is a native Ohioan who grew up in Cleveland. After graduating from Ohio Wesleyan with a degree in chemistry she worked in private industry in Cleveland and Columbus. In 1958, she went to work in the Columbus District

Lab of the US Geological Survey, and within six months was transferred to Washington. Once settled in Washington, she bought a house in Old Total Alexandria because it was convenient to her work in the Old Post Office, and has been an Old Towner ever since.

Her first ski experience took place when a skiing co-worker took her on a Friday night excursion on a Washington Ski Club bus to Charnita (now Ski Liberty). In spite of a disastrous encounter with the rope tow, she determined to become a skier, and the next winter (1972), joined SCWDC and went on a two-week European trip to Val Gardena and Solden. On this trip she made the acquaintance of Gorman Young and roomed with his daughter Nancy. After two weeks she was hooked on skiing.

Shirley became a PVSer around 1980 after going on one of the Grasleys' trips to Spain and on several Wyckoff European trips. She has been to many ski areas in Europe, the west, and New England. Her favorite area is the Arlberg (when there is snow) and her favorite ski runs, among many, are the Big Burn at Snowmass, the bowl under the Little Cloud lift at Snowbird and the Grande Moste at Tignes.
