At the seventh stop light turn right onto Herald Harbor Road (Texaco and Chevron stations at intersection). At first stop sign turn left (still Herald Harbor Road). Follow winding road past Herald Harbor Mini-Mart and Fire Station. Make no unnecessary turns. A sign indicates when it becomes Long Point Road; continue for 1/4-mile to 256 on your left.

IN MEMORIAM

On May 10, long-time PVSer Tony Soler died after a long illness. He was 74. To many, Tony was a quiet, friendly skier with the grace and agility of a Persian cat. His skiing was so effortless and smooth you could recognize him on the mountain as far as you could see him. But, to me, he was not just a fellow skier but a fabulous person and athlete who brought style and skill and competence to all he did.

There was rock climbing: He was a whiz at it long before it became something of a national pastime. Once, en route to the Grand Tetons with friends to do some climbing, he stopped in Wyoming to look at famed Devil's Tower, a sort of Everest to rock climbers. "I think I can climb that," said Tony. So they got out the ropes and pitons and he did. That route is now officially named the Soler Route in honor of his trail-blazing achievement.

There was scuba diving: In the late 40's, Tony followed the instructions in a Popular Mechanics magazine and built a couple of tank and regulator sets. Then he, Charlie Gordon and I, with other friends, chartered a schooner in Miami for the first of several trips to the Bahamas where we scared some sharks, but not as much as they scared us.

There was spelunking: Tony loved cave-exploring and he decided to use his new diving equipment to find unexplored caves, some of them with underwater entries. Once he found such an entrance and went down to see if the passageway came to any air-filled rooms. He took a reel of wire which he played out so he could follow it back to the entrance. All went well until he reached the end of the wire, still underwater and no air chambers. When he started back he found that the silt of centuries had been kicked up by his flippers and his diver's light was useless. He reeled in and followed the wire until it led him to a place too narrow to get through. He twisted and squirmed until with unfailing intuition he found the deepest part of the passageway and escaped.

And there was skiing: As a New Hampshire native I had been skiing since shortly after I learned to walk. So Tony and Charlie decided they would learn by following me. It didn't take them long to decide I was the type of instructor who, at the top of the mountain, says "Suivez moi" and disappears in a cloud of snow never to be seen again. Smartly, they sought help elsewhere and made great progress until, almost overnight, Tony was skiing with his trademark grace and style and I started to learn by following him.

These are just some of the adventures we shared. He was my friend for fifty years. I'll miss him.
