FOUR PVSERS in THREE VALLEYS by Shirley Rettig

On January 25, a group of four PVSers consisting of leader Steve Grenleski, Shirley Rettig, Helen Price and Gorman Young, braved the threat of terrorism and took off for two weeks of skiing in the three valleys of Courchevel, Meribel and Val Thorens in France.

The three valleys constitute the world's largest ski complex. The statistics are staggering - 200 km of groomed trails, 68 snowcats, etc.

Our first week was spent in the middle valley: Meribel-Mottaret, the narrowest and steepest of the three, rather reminiscent of Snowbird, Utah. For the second week, we moved to Courchevel, a valley of wide, gentle green and blue runs.

After several years of poor snow in Europe, this winter the god of snows smiled and gave us excellent conditions. First we enjoyed ten days of sun and then three days of intermittant snow to improve the trails.

After thirteen days of uninterrupted skiing, we bussed back to Geneva to spend one night before flying back to the states. It was a great trip and we thank Steve for all his efforts and a job well done.

EUROPEAN TRIP ADDENDUM by Gorman Young

I am concerned that PVS has ceased to concentrate on its original reason for being-skiing. I especially regret the evident lack of interest in European trips which, for many of us, were once the most exciting and rewarding of ski experiences.

It was very disappointing that the recent trip to France elicited only 4 participants. In the hope of reminding old-timers and new-timers of the joys and advantages of European skiing, I would like to add my impressions of the trip to those of Shirley Rettig.

First of all, despite the threat of terrorism, we had a smooth, incident-free flight to and from Geneva. There was plenty of room to grab 3 seats across in the middle aisle for some "shut-eye" coming and going. The plane was about one third full. The service was great. The drinks were on the house.

Les Trois Vallées area had more snow than they had had in years. We had 10 straight days of clear crisp weather before we got a 10" snow dump as a going-away present for our last two days of skiing. Magnifique! We stayed at Méribel the first week and Courchevel the second and didn't miss a day of skiing as we arranged for a cab to take us over to the next station after skiing on the last day at Méribel. (A 35 minute trip.)

And the eating! Our 3-star hotels came up with 5-course dinners (with beaucoup des desserts!) and ample breakfasts for the all-inclusive rate of about \$93 a day! But the best deal of all was Les Trois Vallees ski pass - good for 375 miles of trails and 200 ski lifts-all for about \$19 a day for seniors, \$25 for other adults.

It is advisable to ski Europe in January when the rates are lower, the snow better, the air colder and school vacations not yet begun. Our 17-day trip was priced at \$2050 - all inclusive except for lifts. You can't beat that. Wish you'd been there!



COOK'S CORNER

The January meeting was held at the home of Janet and Chris Waln. Since both are among the many outstanding cooks in PVS, the meeting was very well attended. The

four recipes here will provide you the opportunity to try the goodies that Janet and Chris served for the meeting.

CHEESY BEVERAGE BITES

Preheat oven to 350*.

Combine, mixing well:

- 2 sticks softened butter or margarine

- 2 cups sifted flour

- 3 oz. sharp cheese, grated

- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

- 1/2 teaspoon salt

- 2 cups Rice Krispies

Pinch off small pieces of dough and shape into 3/4 inch balls. Place on baking sheet and bake in 350* oven for 15-20 minutes. Allow balls to cool before removing from pan with spatula.

GREEN CHILE CHEESE LOG

Between two sheets of waxed paper, roll until 1/4 inch thick:

- 1 (1 lb.) package Velvetta cheese

Whip and spread over Velvetta:
- 1 (8 oz.) package Cream Cheese
(Janet uses Philly "lite")

On top of cream cheese, place:
- 1 (7 oz.) can whole green chilies, seeded, washed, and chopped

1 (4 1/2 oz.) can chopped black olives

Roll from end to end in jelly roll fashion using wax paper to assist with rolling. Chill. Serve with crackers or french bread slices.

The next recipe is also known as Neiman-Marcus Lemon Bars and came about much as Lu Beale's recipe in that Janet's friend was charged \$250 on her bill after requesting this recipe.

LEMON SQUARES

Preheat oven to 350*.

Mix together well and press into 9" X 13" pan:

- 1 box 1emon cake mix

- 1 stick melted butter or margarine

- 1 cup chopped nuts

- I egg

Mix together beating until mixture is smooth:

- 1 (8 oz.) "lite" cream cheese

- 1 box powdered sugar

- 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

- 2 eggs

Spread over mixture in baking pan.

Bake 40 minutes at 350*. Let cool completely before cutting into squares. Yields approximately 4 dozen squares.

SNOWBALL COOKIES

Preheat oven to 375*.

Mix well together:

- 2 sticks (8 oz.) butter or margarine, softened to room temperature

- 4 Tablespoons powdered sugar

- 2 cups flour

- 3 teaspoons vanilla extract

- 1 cup chopped nuts

Using spoon, shape into walnut size balls. Bake at 375* on ungreased cookie sheet for approximately 20 minutes (or light golden brown). Allow to cool 5-10 minutes. Roll in powdered sugar. Yields approximately 4 dozen cookies.

There were several other delicious appetizers served. Two of these have been published in a sailing magazine and will be shared with the club in six months or so when the release expires.

INTRODUCING THE CANDIDATES by Lu Beale

Following are brief profiles of the candidates for president and three executive committee spaces selected by the nominating committee to be voted on for election at the annual meeting in April:

For President:

BILL ANDERSON, club wit, raconteur and Beau Brummell, has been a PVSer since 1973, an ExCommer since 1987 and Veep for the past half year. He is an all-round sport and probably an endangered species. He sings, dances. writes hikes, bicycles, makes a mean martini, models the latest fashions and yes, SKIS.

A fourth generation Washingtonian, Bill went to D.C. public schools and the University of Maryland. He has lived in the same house in Chevy Chase for 44 years and frequently dusts off the crystalchandelier, rolls out the red carpet (literally) and lays out a feast for committee meetings. He is semi-retired and works part time as a realty property manager.

Bill has long been active in organized skiing having leading roles on BRSC and other ski associations. He also served on the board of SCWDC as vice president and treasurer. In 1972 he was awarded the club's annual trophy for outstanding service to SCWDC.

Bill has skied the U.S. and Canadian Rockies, the West, the East, Europe and most local areas (he broke a leg at Blue Knob in 1965). He likes all the areas and has no favorite.

Besides skiing, Bill's other activities include church and Masonic activities. Periodically, he "counts the take" at the Lutherian Church in the shadow of the Capitol where he has been a member all his life. He emphasizes that this duty has no connection to his lottery-playing which has resulted in an occasional windfall. But, for all his talents and hobbies, Bill will forever be known best among PVSers as the EmCee of our 25th Anniversary Dinner and as the man who has been selling cups ever since.

FOR THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

JOAN FLAKE is best known to PVSers for her hospitality at the annual picnic and boating event at the Flake waterfront home in Annapolis. Here she and Glade and four children provide PVSers with a fabulous afternoon of sailing on the 40' Snowflake, wind surfing, rowboating, tubing, or just plain lazing on the wharf before feasting on the patio and watching the sun set across the water.

Joan grew up in Pittsburgh, attended the Univ. of Alabama and graduated from the Univ. of Pittsburgh before coming to Washington to work at the Pentagon.

Let Joan take it from there: "I joined SCWDC and did not know how to ski. (It was THE club to join!) I married Glade and that is when my skiing career (??) started. My first ski trip was to Sugarloaf, Maine, where Glade and a friend took me in the gondola to the top of the mountain. They showed me how to snowplow, pointed the way to the beginner trail that would take me to the bottom and them they LEFT. It took me the rest of the day to get to the bottom but I survived! And to think Sugarloaf is now my favorite ski area! We have skied there yearly since 1976.

"Of course, I had all those kids (four in four years) so that put a damper on skiing for a while. We lived in Korea, Springfield, Va., and finally, Potomac, Md. Although I joined PVS a number of years ago, I am an intermediate skier and ever will be although I have done NASTAR - to prove to the kids that I still have it in me."

Joan is active in church and educational affairs. Her hobbies include needlepoint, gardening and "my little row boat which gives me lots of pleasure." She is, she says, "Unemployed and love every minute of it."

BOB MCNEILL has been a PVSer only a few years but he has been on the slopes about 60 years - starting as a child on the hillocks of a nearby golf club - and the word is out - he's one gung-ho skier. He and wife, Martha, are also marvelous hosts as PVSers who have attended club meetings at their Rockville home will readily testify.

Bob was born and raised in the Boston area. After graduating in 1952 from Northeastern University, he received MA and PhD degrees from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy located at Tufts University. He taught for a while at Tufts and afthe University of Peurto Rico. In 1957 he came to the Washington area where he worked in the Budget Bureau, Kennedy's White House and the Department of Commerce before joining the Ford Motor Company as Director of International Affairs. Since 1967 he has been Executive Vice Chairman of the Emergency Committee for American Trade which lobbies for U.S. trade policies that enhance international trade.

Although Bob has skied extensively in Europe and the United States, he says his most memorable ski experience was taking and passing the National Ski Patrol tests. He has been a member of the Ski Liberty Ski Patrol for 10 years. Weekends, when he's not on duty at Liberty, he is often skiing in Vermont.

He has no favorite ski area. "I am perfectly happy," he says, "On any ski slope no matter what its length or degree of steepness. I simply love to ski."

As tout le monde knows by now , PVS is THE CLUB FOR SKIERS. People like Bob McNeill make it so.

JACK PEOPLES joined PVS in March 1984 and 10 months later inaugerated what has become one of the most successful annual ski trips in PVS history -MONT SUTTON. For 6 straight years, he has chaperoned a flock of PVSers and would-be PVSers - young, old and ancient - to La Paimpolaise where he rules supreme with a clarion voice and a gentle touch.

Jack was born and raised near Paterson, N.J. He took pre-med courses at Bucknell and on graduation in 1950 went to Wyeth Laboratories where he worked in pharmaceutical sales and management for 36 years. On retirement in 1987, he skied 22 different mountains in one year alone. He has skied about 128 ski areas in North and South America, including most major resort mountains. His personal favorites are Sun Valley, Jackson Hole, and, of course, Sutton.

It all began in 1946 when Jack, with the occupational forces in Japan, climbed Mt. Nikko on skin-covered skis. A seed was planted not to sprout until 10 years later since when it has been growing, if not out of control, definitely on the wild side.

In 1957, Jack moved to Uniontown, PA, only 45 minutes from Seven Springs. Here he chose skiing rather than golf as a recreation so the kids -5 girls and 2 boys - could join in Four of the 7 became top-rate skiers and all still ski.)

In 1967, Jack was transferred to the Washington area and has lived in Gaithersburg ever since. When not sking, he is active in civic affairs (he is a past president of the Gaithersburg Lions Club), sails and loves to dance.

But, Jack's forte is organizing and leading ski trips and, as the song goes, "People who need Peoples are - " please turn back to the top of page 6.for answer.
