We immediately checked on his condition and were relieved to find out that although he stayed down on his back in obvious pain, was able to move all his extremities and he said he was ok but for the pain in his back. We stayed with him until the ski patrol came and we were convinced he was in good hands. Thinking about this incident reminds me of what a dangerous activity skiing is and how I have often thought of how I wish I had eyes in the back of my head to see skiers approaching. Of course, the next best thing is for us always to be looking around to know what may come our way and to ski defensively. Fortunately in the case I saw, there were not any skiers in the way of this young out of control skier. My other thought about this is why we don't see more ski patrols out on the slopes trying to slow down skiers who are out of control. We all need to be aware of ski safety.

Well, enough of that bad stuff and my preaching, because our club is having a great ski season and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the ski trip committee and all the trip leaders for providing such exciting and fun trips this year.

Last September we skied Valle Nevado and toured oround Sartiago, the very European capital of Chile. It was, truiy, our best ski vacation ever. The huge resort, built solely for skiing by the French in 199 atop an Andean mesa ot 9,600 feet, is gorgeous. Dark wood structures topped with starkly pointed roofs contrast mognificentily with the vast snowfields and the towering Andes. And sking is unreal. By Itself. Valle Nevodo offers some 26,000 acres ( 40 square miles!) of 5 sking amongst the majestic Andes Mountains. And Volle Nevado is now lift linked to two other valleys, Lo Parva and El Colorado, providing the largest ski circuit in the Southern Hemisphere ( 40,000 ocres) and a 4,000 foot vertical. Most of the skiing is intermediate: however, there is more beginner and expert sking than in any three $U$. S. resorts.

But sking isn't the oniy reason to go to Chile. There is lots more to see. Thus, we are planning a 12 day trip. (Shorter and longer stays are easy, you can come early or late and leave early or late.) Ski for a week and then spend four additional days in beautifil Santiago. We'll tour the city including St. Crlstobal, the downtown, 1,500 foot massit providing incomparable views and one evering well have dirner there. We'll visit Vopparaiso, Chile's largest seaport, and lunch ond tour at Vina del Mar, the year-round beach playground of South Americi's rict and fancus. We plan a haf day visit to wine country and a tour of the picturesque Concha y Foro vineyard. You may also indulge in optional visits to lake country and to Easter Island. Further, we are exploring the possibility of getting tickets to Chile's Opera Naciona/ which we visited. All told, our trip should provide a spectacular introduction to a dramatic new Hemisphere.

Our men were not as good as the women as Charles Huggins finished 4 th, twenty seven hundredths of a second behind the third place medalist who was twelve hundredths of a second slower than the second place medalist. Jack Peoples failed to beat Sally Finan and payed up his bet at the awards banquet. Proposed Changes to PVS By-Laws
The following changes to the by-laws have been proposed by a committee appointed by the President and approved by the Executive Committee. The proposed changes will be voed on at the annual meeting on April 15, 1997. Additions are underlined. Deletions are shown with a line drawn through them.

1) PURPOSE

Good fellowship and the shared enjovment of good skiing.
2) SECTION I - MEMBERSHIP
E. Membership shall not exceed two hundred dues-paying persons.
F. If any member should behave in a way prejudicial to the physical or financial welfare of other members, the Executive Committee may, by a maiority vote and at its sole discretion, take whatever steps necessary, including expulsion of that member, to insure the well being of the club. Absenter members, यpen upplieation, shall berreteredto activemembership ahead of new applicants.
3) SECTION IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS
D. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for the general direction of the club and shall have power to transact all erdiny club business including membership and financial issues. Four members of the Executive Committee constitute a quorum.
