Approach Annapolis on Route 50. Turn off at first Annapolis exit (also labelled "Parole"). Stay right--road loops back under highway and becomes Route 178, General's Highway. Stay on it for about five miles. At the seventh stop light turn right onto Herald Harbor Road (Texaco and Gulf stations at intersection). At first stop sign turn left (still Herald Harbor Road). Follow winding street past Herald Harbor Mini-Mart and Fire Station, make no unnecessary turns. A sign indicates when it becomes Long Point Road; continue for 1/2 mile to 256, on your left.

COOK'S CORNER

October is the month for pumpkins. We see big, orange, juicy pumpkins at the supermarket, on roadside stands and by the end of the month, on everybody's front porch or in a window. Seemed to be a good time to break out a couple of favorite recipes using pumpkin.

PUMPKIN BREAD

Myra Evans

Mix together:

- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 3 cups sugar

Add:

- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 2/3 cup water
- 1 can (16 oz) pumpkin
- 2 cups nuts (optional)

Mix together until smooth. Pour into 2 greased and floured loaf pans. Bake at 350* for 1 hour and 10 minutes. Insert knife in center of bread to bottom of pan. When knife comes out clean, cool slightly. Then turn on wire rack. Freezes nicely or can be kept in refrigerator for 10-14 days.

My mother uses basically the same recipe, but bakes the bread in 3 1-pound coffee cans and 2 #303 cans filling half full. Grease and flour cans. This makes a nice round bread easily sliced for topping with whipped cream cheese or butter. Time is the same for baking. Bread will pull from the sides of the cans when done. If it doesn't come out easily, remove bottom with can opener and gently push through.

PUMPKIN CHEESECAKE

Mix well:

- 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- 2 Tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/4 cup butter or oleo, melted

Firmly press into bottom of a 9-inch springform pan. Set aside.

In medium bowl, mix well and set aside:

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground mace
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat until light and fluffy:

- 3 (8 oz) packages cream cheese

Gradually add, mixing well:

- 6 Tablespoons sugar

Add, beating well:

- 1 egg
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 Tablespoons whipping cream

Add and beat until smooth:

- 1 Tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

Add pumpkin mixture and beat well. Pour into springform pan. Bake at 350* for 50-55 minutes. Center may be soft, but will firm when chilled. Let cool on wire rack. Chill thoroughly. Garnish with whipped cream and pecans, if desired.

As strange as it may seem, there are several people who "don't do pumpkin". Oh, these people told me, they bake a really good pumpkin pie using the recipe on the can (I do too) - Janet Marx, Jean Hensley, Alice Swalm. We will see these ladies in print in the future with something besides pumpkin.
