



From the Washington Monument, we trekked over to the WWII Memorial and on to the Korean, Vietnam Women's, and Vietnam Memorials. The Lincoln Memorial was majestic as always with a student orchestra playing on the steps of the reflecting pool. It was quite moving as you looked at the Washington Monument in the distance. It was National Parks week so there was also a choir



performing at the Jefferson Memorial; also quite stirring.



Walking through the park pathways to the FDR Memorial was a delightful journey. This historical treasure is truly a step back in time with engraved granite quotes and bronzed statues of FDR, whose vision and insight birthed new beginnings for many things present in our daily lives. Eleanor Roosevelt held court in a beautiful bronzed likeness near FDR and his dog Fala was also depicted along the granite wall that told their story through quotes embedded in the walls along the way. Flowing waterfalls connected this contiguous granite-walled museum. It was breathtaking reading through the quotes of FDR that guided the US through times of many changes. We

finished our tour at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, which faces the Tidal Basin. It was a beautiful sight with the swan boats and paddleboats tooling around.

After finishing our hiking tour, we ended this terrific day with a great lunch at The Hamilton (in the former Garfinckel's building). It is a beautiful restaurant with richly colored wood-paneled walls and large chandeliers that hang all along the dining room. It was a perfect place to end the day with the other PVS hikers, delicious food, and a short walk (thank goodness) to the Metro!

SKI TALK MAY 2016



The costs for skiing continue to rise. Ski lift ticket prices are skyrocketing. The window price at Vail is now \$175 per day. Last year, Steamboat was \$150 and Aspen/Snowmass keeps going up. Fortunately, going with a group like PVS and buying tickets in advance decreases the price somewhat and makes skiing more affordable. It is getting harder to negotiate prices at the resorts, but the good news is that many resorts still offer senior discounts or totally free skiing! I have a list of 97 such resorts nationwide. Most of those are small resorts, and locally we do have a few. For 70+ skiers WISP, Canaan, Timberline, Bryce and Massanutten are free. At 80+ you can ski free at Seven Springs. Out West, Alta offers 80+ ski-free, and at least one of our members was able to take advantage of that this year.

We are pleased to be able to offer the Snowmass trip again this year. Our group likes to stay at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet, because it is ski in/ski out, and they offer both breakfast and lunch. So while prices keep going up, we are reluctant to change hotels. We are offering only a "land" package to Snowmass this year. When we planned trips last year, we included an air package for both Snowmass and Snowbird. In both cases, we did not have enough members sign up for air, and therefore could not get the group rate. (That was not a big loss, since group air rates are no longer a significant bargain.) It appears that most people prefer making their own air arrangements. That way they can use mileage points and leave from the airport of choice. There are many flights to Aspen through Denver, Chicago, Houston and Minneapolis. A less expensive way to go is to fly to Denver and take a van/bus to Aspen. However, it is a long drive.

The other cost related development is in regard to the proposed Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) Eurofest to Grindelwald, Switzerland. BRSC plans a European ski trip each year and local ski clubs, who are part of the council, participate. As of the time I am writing this column, it appears that BRSC will not be going to Grindelwald because of the high cost of the trip! We will know more about where BRSC plans to go for Eurofest 2017 in a few weeks. So, I will not have that information before this TOOT goes to press. However, be assured your Ski Trip Committee is following this closely, and a ski trip to Europe will be planned for 2017, whether with BRSC or otherwise. Information will be announced in the June TOOT.

In the meantime, I strongly encourage you to support our Snowmass trip and send in your deposit as soon as possible. See information elsewhere in this TOOT.
