Something NEW for PVS


Our Monthly Meeting in October Will Be Lunch at Culinaire Tuesday, October 18, at 1820 North Fort Myer Drive, Arlington, VA Arrive between 11:30 and noon.

For a change of pace, PVS decided to hold its October meeting at Culinaire Restaurant, the restaurant at the Art Institute of Washington's culinary school in Rosslyn. The culinary students, supervised by a chef instructor, cook and serve, and the guests dine and enjoy. The light and airy setting is on the 12th floor with large picture windows looking outward as well as large picture windows looking into the kitchen. The restaurant will be reserved for PVS. The capacity is up to 35 diners. Expect prices to be around \$20.00 or slightly less for three courses. The culinary school accepts credit cards only (no cash) and there is no tipping.

Join us in Crystal City for a comfortable hike south on the Mount Vernon Trail to lunch on the river at Indigo Landing Restaurant www.indigolanding.com. Each way the walk is around 3 miles. There are 14 lifts and 57 trails of varying levels. In addition, there are a variety of shops and restaurants. The Richmond Ski Club, who was sponsoring the weekend, planned a hike, happy

Once again we will be staying slope-side at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC), just below the Snowmass Mall and from where you can ski directly to the lifts. Check the website at http://mountainchalet.com. This year we are offering a "Land Only" package since most people prefer to make their own arrangements. The total package includes: land transfer from Aspen airport to SMC and return; 5 day lift ticket (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus) with option for extra days; 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); daily breakfasts; daily soup lunch; luggage handling; a welcome reception, an "all guest" hotel-sponsored party, a "pizza" party and a farewell group dinner to celebrate our trip. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability. Trip insurance is available through Encompasse Tours and is highly suggested.



Wilbert L. "Bill" Anderson

June 29, 1928 – September 5, 2016

Wilbert L. (Bill) Anderson was born June 29th, 1928 at Garfield Hospital, Washington, D.C., where his mother had trained as a nurse. There, she had met Bill's father, whose family were long time members of the Lutheran Church of the Reformation. He attended D.C. public schools and the University of Maryland. He was a member of the D.C. National Guard, and was called to active duty during the Korean War. He was with the 260th Gun Battery, remained in contact with many of his fellow soldiers over the years, and always picked 260 whenever he played the lottery.

From youth, Bill was interested in art, and did sketching and painting in various mediums. When he was 11 years old, he met Howard Chandler Christy, who painted "Scene at the Signing of the Constitution of the United States," which hangs in the Capitol. Bill's father worked at the Washington Navy Yard, and took Bill to meet the artist, who was working on a painting in the Yard's sail loft. Mr. Christy gave Bill a photograph of the signing picture, and attached a note "To Billy Anderson - from one artist to another" and signed and dated it, March 11, 1940.

Bill was also a fan of Broadway musicals. While in high school, he served as an extra in "The Student Prince" and "Blossom Time," when they toured Washington. He was an avid skier and traveler. He served in various offices in the Ski Club of Washington D.C. and the Potomac Valley Skiers, and was a

member of the Eastern High School Alumni Association. He worked for the D.C. Title Company, Interstate Building and Loan Company, and Weaver Brothers Property Management.

A memorial service was held on Saturday, September 17, at the Lutheran Church of the Reformation, 212 East Capitol Street, NE, Washington, DC 20003. Private Internment of cremains will be at Fort Lincoln Cemetery at a later date. Bill was an excellent and elegant skier. After skiing, he often wore a beautiful fur coat that looked like it came from the Great Gatsby era. At the end of a hard day of skiing he liked to relax with an icy cold Martini. We all remember the very elegant and formal Thanksgiving dinners that he often prepared for our November ski club meetings."

Nancy McKinley: "Bill was a former President of PVS, a great wit, and a friend to all."

Barb **Leonhardt**: "Following the church service for Bill, there was a coffee/cake get together in a meeting room in the church. Then, many of the attendees went to Hunter's Bar & Grill (a Friday-night enjoyment of Bill's) in Potomac, MD, to hear and tell stories about Bill, while enjoying a cocktail or soda. Other PVSers, who hadn't made it to the church service, joined the group and soon there was a group of 25 PVSers. Bill's friend, Sue Ann Norian, arranged for hors d'oeuvres to be served with the drinks, which were enjoyed by all. Thank you Sue Ann! Bill sure would have enjoyed being there to hear the stories, especially the ones in which he was a major part of the story -- maybe indeed he was there!!"

Richard "Dick" Phillip Laeser

April 8, 1938 to September 13, 2016

Dick Laeser, smart, kind, upbeat, and a man with a good and clever sense of humor, died in peace, with dignity and grace, at his home in Reston, Virginia, after a 28-year battle with many different types of cancer. Those, who knew Dick, will remember him as always smiling, rarely talking about his difficult medical situation, and always enjoying exactly what he was doing in the moment. Dick was born on April 8,1938 in Green Bay,

Wisconsin. He is survived by his wife of 27 years, Sandra Gindin Laeser; two daughters, Holly Cox and Kathryn Laeser of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; three granddaughters, Kaylynn Cox, Ashlin LaBelle and husband Brice, and Breckin Cox; four great grandchildren, McKinley, Alayna, Bryson and Alivia; brother, Thomas Laeser and wife Joyce of Los Alamos, New Mexico. Dick graduated from Marquette University High School in 1956, he received his bachelor of science in electrical engineering from MIT in 1962, and he received a master of science in electrical engineering from the University of Southern California in 1968. Four years later he graduated from the program for management development at the Harvard Graduate School of Business. He joined the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in 1964 after two years as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Army Signal Corps where he managed development of the Army Intelligence Command-Control Information System. In 1974, after serving in various capacities in the computing, communications and tracking, and data acquisition support of planetary missions, Dick became mission operations manager for the

Voyager project. After serving as Voyager mission director from 1977 to 1981, he was named project manager for Voyager 2's 1986 encounter with Uranus, which also included planning for the 1989 flyby of Neptune. In 1987 to 1991, Dick established, managed and decommissioned JPL's space station support office in Reston, Virginia. He then was appointed special assistant to the director, Management Systems, focusing on change of JPL's culture and its underlying management systems and work processes. He worked for JPL for 35 years and retired in 2000. Dick was president of the Verdugo Gymnastics Club, a nonprofit women's gymnastics center and served on the competition staff of the 1984 Olympiad in Los Angeles. Dick had many interests that he pursued in his retirement, such as: downhill skiing with the Potomac Valley Skiers, adventure traveling - his favorite: the North Pole, making iMovies of trips and special events, attending Washington regional theater, volunteering on the Board of the cluster of townhomes where he lived, collecting eclectic art, building a boat that he loved taking out on Lake Thoreau, where he lived, and following the Green Bay Packers and the Washington Nationals. After Dick retired, when someone asked him what he did at JPL, he always proudly said, "I flew robots to the planets." Classic Dick!! Dick Schwartzbard remembers Dick Laeser: I met Dick in 1972 when we were both enrolled in a program at Harvard Business School. At the time, Dick was working at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. It was many years later, at a 30th reunion, that I again encountered Dick. I learned that when he retired from JPL he took the unusual step of retiring to the Washington, DC area. I know, it's not a well-known retirement area, but if you want an active retirement versus vegetation, it's a great place to locate, and Dick was not one to vegetate.

We discovered that we shared many interests, high among them skiing. One of the best things I've done for PVS was to introduce the club to Dick and to get him to join. Dick participated in many PVS trips, but more importantly he served as club treasurer for many years, faithfully and accurately looking after our finances. He retired from that position only when his health no longer permitted his involvement.

Dick was also active in his homeowners' association, serving as treasurer there, too. He and Sandy were avid theatergoers, frequently going to New York for the Broadway shows. He was an active supporter of

both Arena Stage and Signature Theater, and he participated in a variety of local theater events.


Dick had been plagued by several different cancers during his life. He battled each of them and received a clean diagnosis after almost all of them, but he lost the fight to the latest one. He didn't go easy though and fought through an increasingly debilitating situation. I never once, though, heard him complain. Whether healthy or suffering, he was always upbeat, optimistic, and in good spirits, even when in pain. A good man, gone too soon.

Jan Marx: I fondly remember a Sun Peaks Canada trip with Dick and Sandy. Everyday after breakfast, Dick had the grooming map in hand with an itinerary for the day. He led his group hither and yon keeping all of our skiing skills in mind. We wanted to ski in the sunshine and he found the sunny slopes for us. What a joy!

Dave Warthen: Dick was a very humble man, but he was also a world-renowned scientist whose accomplishments are only dreamed about by children and adults alike. He quietly revealed amazing wonders about planets far away in our solar system.


