

President's Message

I write this month on War and Peace. PVS members might ask, "Why?"

Members can be on a chairlift sitting next to young Super People. Super People will be discussing Garrett Gulch. They go to Garrett Gulch on purpose. Looking for Sheer Bliss, by mistake, you, a PVS member, can find yourself on Garrett Gulch, a steep, narrow, concave path between tall, impenetrable trees. With luck, skiing down Garrett Gulch, you may fall on only 40 percent of your turns, always landing face down. You may find solace by claiming rightly that you made more than half the turns; however, on the chairlift Super People are calling Garrett Gulch fun, exhilarating, a piece of cake. When they do, you need something to divert their attention or, at least, to divert yours. I suggest *War and Peace*.

At the core of *War and Peace* is Tolstoy's treatment of Napoleon's leadership of the French armies all the way across Europe, deep into Russia, reaching beyond Moscow, and, then, their subsequent retreat all the way back to France. When he was winning against the European powers, Napoleon could hardly do wrong. Employing what is even today considered brilliant strategy, he captured territory further and further east. Defeated, opposing armies almost withered away. But when the tide (or snow) turned, Napoleon could do no right. Defeat followed defeat. Napoleon ended exiled at Elba.

Napoleon was the same person with the same skills when he was winning and when he was losing. Tolstoy asks how it can be that a person who is so successful can become so unsuccessful. Tolstoy suggests and attempts to demonstrate that neither emperors nor generals cause victories or defeats. Great men do not create what happens. A myriad of individual acts of multitudes of people combines to create moods that leaders, no matter how brilliant, are unable to overcome.

Tolstoy argues that outcomes result from changes in the tides of individual soldier and citizen acts as the oceanic and river flows are the sum of individual water molecules. The question that Tolstoy asks – to what extent are leaders responsible for outcomes attributed to them for which they receive credit or blame – is worth pondering. To what extent do we control our destinies? To what extent are our acts driven by the tides?

A more current reference: Britain's Prime Minister Tony Blair said in his memoirs that when things were going well, his actions gained broad acceptance. When they were not, he could not succeed. Success and failure are

When the Washington Nationals or Cleveland Indians and their players are hot, they win in streaks; their players make amazing plays. When the streaks end, the same teams and players play. They make strikeouts and errors. They lose. Other organizations experience parallel phenomena.

Setting aside not totally irrelevant issues of free will and determinism, we govern our fates, mostly, perhaps. One has to do right things. One has to work hard. One has to care. But maybe we are less in control less than we believe. Maybe what we think and do are more reflections of our times. Tolstoy suggested that to our benefit and to our detriment, we are buffeted by tides we cannot control.

How much are supposedly great leaders and we the cause of outcomes? Issues of causation matter to PVS. When we gracefully glide down the hill – the sun is shining, the snow is firm, the air is crisp - we ski well because of our good decisions to be skiing, years of practice and many paid for lessons. We are responsible for our skiing, our excellent skiing. When our skis cross and we fall on hard packed snow, bad conditions, worse karma and the snow tides are to blame – not PVS members.

Next month primary things: skiing and food. Or, food and skiing?

SKI TALK OCTOBER 2017



Ski season is rapidly approaching. It is already snowing in the Rockies and the predictions are that there could be above average snow conditions in the west this year. As you may remember, I have been demoing skis for two years trying to find the "right" skis for me. Unfortunately, there is no magic, but I did make a choice. I bought a new pair of Blizzard Black Pearl skis. I just had the bindings put on them at Sun and Ski (Ski Chalet) and picked them up while they were setting up for their big clearance event. I hope that some of you went to the clearance and bought some new gear. It was fun looking through all of the skis, boots and clothing and then carrying my skis out the door. According to Kerry Hines, the snow predictions for this season are:

Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho: Normal to above-average snowfall Pacific Northwest: Normal snowfall Whistler Blackcomb and Banff/Lake Louise: Normal to above-average snowfall California: Normal to slightly below-average snowfall Northeast: Normal snowfall

We are hoping we can extend the PVS ski season this year. We have received a proposal for a ski trip to Mt. Snow, Vermont, in March. PVS members Alice McNulty and Dick Lau have proposed to lead a trip to their favorite Eastern ski resort. They have been skiing at Mt. Proposed Ski Trip

New *New* *New* PROPOSAL FOR SKI TRIP TO MT. SNOW, VERMONT <u>March 18-24, 2018</u> If interested, please let us know by the end of November



This is an opportunity to ski at Mt. Snow, Vermont, with Alice McNulty and Dick Lau who have been skiing there for years. This is a beautiful mountain with a total acreage of 589. The base elevation is 1,900 feet; with a summit elevation of 3,600 feet; and vertical drop of 1,700 feet. There are twenty lifts and tree terrain available on all four mountain faces. The percentage of terrain for different abilities is: 14% green, 73% blue and 13% black.

HOTEL: We would stay at the ski-in/out **Grand Summit Hotel**. It has an exercise room, pool and spa.

LIFT TICKETS: Senior 4-day midweek \$140; senior 5-day midweek \$170. People might want to get the 4-day and ski at Stratton Mountain one day. It's about a 45-minute drive.

PROPOSED DATES: Proposed dates March 18-24 to provide 5 full days of skiing.

TRAVEL FROM DC: Air: Flights from Dulles to Hartford on United are 1.5 hours and are \$199-\$169 depending on whether you fly Sunday or Monday.

Transportation to the resort from Bradley Airport (Hartford) to Mount Snow is provided by Thomas Transportation in a private van for about \$41-\$46/per person depending on whether we would need a trailer for skis and baggage.

ESTIMATED COST: The **estimated** cost would be approximately \$900:

Airfare \$200 Airport transfer \$84. Room approximately \$400 (per person/shared). Senior midweek lift ticket (5 days) \$170. No meals included but we will try to set up a welcome wine and cheese party. We will also check with the hotel (or other local restaurants) for a farewell dinner and the cost.

I have been skiing at Mount Snow for almost 25 years. It really has something for everyone in terms of terrain, and each year the snowmaking gets better and better - so there are virtually no gaps. Dick Lau and I would be happy to ski with anyone and show you the mountain. West Dover and Wilmington are charming, postcard VT towns with some excellent restaurants. There is also the possibility of a moonlight sleigh ride (weather permitting), snowmobiling, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing.

Once again, we will be staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC), which offers a convenient ski in, ski out location. Check the web site at http://www.mountainchalet.com. The "Land Only" package includes: transportation to and from Aspen airport (7am -11pm); 5-day Senior lift pass (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus) with option for extra days; 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); daily breakfasts; daily soup lunch; luggage handling; a welcome reception; an "all guest" hotel sponsored party; a pizza party and a farewell group dinner to celebrate our trip. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability. Trip insurance is available through Encompasse Tours and is highly suggested. For trail information, check http://www.aspensnowmass.com.

The basic package at \$1,630 includes a lift pass discount for skiers 65 and over. Skiers under 65 will have to add \$93.00.

We had some twists and turns through interesting neighborhoods to get to Ingrid Dallaire's


