A TASTING OF WINES WITH FOOD by Doris Mair

On Saturday evening, December 13, twelve PVS members and guests met at Don and Pat Cope's home to partake of their very enjoyable food and wine. As usual, the selections were excellent.

A first course of Jarlsberg cheese accompanied by a Muscadet de Sevre et Maine "Les Mesnils" 1985, was followed by a serving of lump crab with Remoulade sauce and a Puligny-Montrachet "Les Folatieres" 1984. (The Knee and this author were observed "licking the platter clean" on this favorite course.)

A dish of mushrooms a la Escargot with a Ravenswood Zinfandel - Old Hill Vineyard 1984 was followed by a dish of Escargot in Mini Croustades with an excellent Silver Oak Cabernet Sauvignon, Alexander Valley 1979. Both dishes were prepared in a distinctive garlic butter base which were complemented by the heavy dry red wines. (Continued on next page)

A final course of Paupiette of Beef with a superb Ch. Lynch Bages, Pauillac 1983, was topped off with a wheel of Stilton cheese accompanied by a Taylor, Fladgate & Yeatman vintage Port 1983.

Coffee and additional tastings of unfinished bottles followed before we poured ourselves out into the night wondering whether we "Kneeded" all those calories just before squeezing ourselves into our ski clothes for the coming season.

On the positive side, you can save a bunch of money on lift tickets by doing some shopping before skiing. Buy your Keystone ticket at KingSoopers for \$20. (An Arapahoe Basin ticket is only \$17.) At Vickars Gas you can save \$3 on a Copper Mt. pass and at Albertsons you can get a Breckenridge pass for \$20. Vail is also working on a deal.

Part of the reason for this flurry of deals is that while there were some 52 million lift tickets sold last year this represented only a one per cent increase over the previous season

the smallest increase ever.


