
Dec 2-4. I hate all of you! Everyone from the PVS group enjoyed their tour of China though many suffered a few days' illness. Obviously Asian Flu

The Winter Fest Dinner recipes were requested for a Cook's Corner so that all can try them. Due to

space limitations, the "Cook" will devote two months to this effort.

SALMON MOUSSE

Drain and flake with a fork: - I (15 1/2-ounce) can red salmon

Mix together to soften:

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water

Add to gelatin mixture and stir until gelatin is dissolved:

- 1/4 cup boiling water

Process in food processor until smooth:

- Salmon
- Gelatin mixture
- 1 small onion, minced
- l cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 Tablespoon dried dill weed
- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 1 1/2 cups whipping cream

Pour mixture into lightly oiled 5 1/2 cup fish shaped mold. Chill.

Combine and chill for 5 hours:

- 1/2 cup commercial sour cream
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Unmold mousse on a chilled serving platter. Frost with sour cream mixture.

Decorate fish with:

- Pimento-stuffed olive slices for eyes
- Cucumber slices for gills and tail
- Pimiento slice for mouth

Garnish tray with:

- Watercress and Lemon wedges Serve with crackers or rye bread slices.

VEAL SCALOPPINI WITH MUSHROOMS

Combine:

- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper

Sprinkle over:

- 2 pounds veal, very thinly sliced

With mallet or edge of saucer, pound flour mixture into both sides of meat slices.

Heat in large skillet (I prefer electric): - 1/4 cup vegetable oil

Saute over medium heat 4 minutes each side.

Add and simmer uncovered for 15 minutes:

- 3/4 cup dry white wine
- 2 6-oz. cans button mushrooms

Serve sauce over scaloppini. Serves 6.

THAT PINK THING - FROZEN STRAWBERRY DESSERT

For crust and topping, mix together:

- 1 cup flour
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- 1 stick butter or margarine, melted

Bake in shallow pan at 350* for 20 minutes. When cool, flake into crumbs. Reserve 2/3 cup crumbs for topping. Place remainer in bottom of 9 X 13 X 2 baking dish or pan.

Place mixer in sink and put piece of wax paper along back wall. It splatters.

In large mixing bowl, mix on high speed until stiff peaks are formed (10-15 min):

- 2 egg whites
- 2 Tablespoons lemon juice
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 10-oz package thawed unsweetened strawberries

Fold carefully into mixture:

- 1 8-oz carton whipping cream, whipped

Pour over crumbs. Sprinkle reserved crumbs on top. Freeze until firm. Remove from freezer to refrigerator one hour before serving. Will serve 12 - 16 nicely.
