JULY EVENT Steak and Swim at the Elrods

When: Saturday, July 16th.(Rain date:Sunday July 17th) 2:00 p.m. until dark.

Cost: Approximately \$8 a person will get you a delmonico
steak, potatoes, potables, plus salad & dessert
contributed by guests.

RESERVATIONS ARE REQUIRED: Call Ray McKinley by July 13th.(759-4432) There is no limit but head count is necessary for purchasing steaks. Those making reservations must show (unless they cancel by July 13th). No-shows will be responsible for the cost of their steaks.

Directions to the Elrods: Take Route 1-95 south towards Richmond. Take the Dumfries/Manassas Exit for Route 234. Go left on Rte 234, then right on old Route 1 to left on Virginia Route 1107 at the Triangle Plaza sign. Follow 1107 to a T type deadend and bear right on Cabin Road and continue about 4 mile to No. 18510 on the right. (It's the only all stone house.) Phone: 703-221-6364.

When: Saturday August 13th. (Rain date: Sunday August 14th.)
Anytime after 1 p.m. (Supper will be around 5 p.m.)

Where: The Glade Flakes! home in Annapolis.

Coordinator: Charlotte Reith. If weather doubtful call her. (765-1810).

Instructions: Charlotte says bring your own hamburger, weenie, whatever, to grill. Plus a dessert or salad to share. (Check with Charlotte.) Bring your own cooler to keep your goodies fit. Bring blankets or chairs as you wish.

Cost: For a small fee beer, soft drinks, charcoal fire, cooking utensils, plates, utensils, napkins, condiments will be provided.

Reservations: Numbers limited due to shortage of sanitary facilities. This event is almost full so call Charlotte now if you are interested. Cancel if you can't make it so someone else can come.

Warning: Don't park on the street. There will be Flake youngsters to direct you to safe nearby parking so the Annapolis fuzz won't ticket or haul the car away.

Directions: From Highway #50 exit at PAROLE Exit (first exit for Annapolis) take left turn on West Street and go to second stop light where turn right on Solomon Islands Road. Go one long block to first stop light and take a left on Forest Drive and proceed about 5 miles - (name of Drive will change to Bay Ridge Rd and, then, to Farragut Avenue). Enter gates which have a sign "Bay Ridge" and take first left on East Lake Drive. Bear to right and continue around lake until reaching Number 40 - the Flakes!

Go through next traffic light and take the 4th left onto Scott Drive. A sign will say

no trucks - restricted bridge ahead. (If you pass the high school, you've gone too far!) Go over the wooden bridge (single lane) to next stop sign. Turn left onto Overlea Drive to 9211. (First driveway on left.)

Rub-A-Dub-Dub, PVS in a Tub by Mary Jane McCarthy

The first annual white water rafting trip got off to a memorable start on June 11 bound for the Youghiagheny (pronounced Yah-gah-gay-KNEE) River in Ohiopyle, Pennsylvania. A group of 8 PVSers and 6 friends assembled with feelings of anticipation and/or trepidation for initiation into rafting. Off we went in either 4 or 6 man rubber rafts, after first electing a captain — George Simonis got a landslide vote for our 6-man raft, amid sotto voce references to Captain Queeg and mutiny.

The river was very beautiful, narrow, dark green rushing water, steep hills on each side and full of rafts, shouted commands and ROCKS. Our leader gave explicit instructions on how to maneuver at each rapid, all of them had terrifying names, such as Double Hydraulic, Devil's Eye, etc. We took our first rapid backward, in spite of our good captain's commands, got hung up on rocks which produced gales of laughter. The sensation of bouncing through the rapids was exciting and to come through unscathed was exhilerating; to feel the raft going right over underwater rocks is scary.

The captain, George, maintained calm through-out the 6-hour, 7-mile course. He was ably assisted by a co-pilot, one Bob Grasley. Raft-mates: Dorothy Mills paddled furiously throughout; Mary Lee Grasley gasped at hazards ahead, then joined us in laughter, jokes and delight when we got through the hair-raisers; Dina Taylor, our able trip leader, lent encouragement to the fearful (me) and maintained composure until a victim of a water-war; Shirley Rettig was part of a 4-man raft and appeared to be their most stalwart member. Unfortunately, our captain's wife Toni Simonis stayed ashore, joining the group later for drinks and dinner. bunch was a welcome respite; simple but ample sandwiches served on a flat rock under which nestled 2 copperheads. We ended the trip by again toting our raft on our heads uphill, tired but jubilent, and exhalting that we survived nearmissed capsizing.

After spending the night in Uniontown, we headed for Fallingwater, near Ohioplye. It is one of Frank Lloyd Wright's most widely acclained works, designed in 1936, for Pittsburgh department store owner Edgar J. Kaufmann. The house is built over a waterfall, amid a beautiful forest, massive sand-stone boulders, and rhododendrom and mountain laurel. The house itself is a blend of modern, practical styling, and full of treasures from all parts of the globe.

We enjoyed one another, made new friends and unanimously voted this a superlative must-be-repeated trip.

Here it is in the middle of summer, it's hot and it's muggy, at least while I'm writing this, and what

does the Knee have to offer this month but sick material. Seriously, some of our club members have been suffering from some sickknees.

At the end of May, <u>Jenckes Mason</u> was recovering at home from being hit by a car (He thought he had the right of way and the car's bumper hit him right at the Knee-er-knee.) He complained that he couldn't swallow and then his vision became fuzzy. At the hospital they found he had a minor stroke in the medula. (Not being a doctor, I thought he'd had it in the house.) A full recovery was expected.

When I chatted with <u>Dot</u> at the end of June her major complaint was that their air conditioner was out. Jencke's vision had just returned and he was grousing to get out on a hike. They had just returned from a weekend at their Front Royal house getting it ready for their still scheduled October 29 hike. Right on.

Meanwhile, back in the Washington area, <u>Bob Wyckoff</u> is making a splendid recovery from brain surgery. At the end of May, he suddenly found he couldn't talk straight. After various tests and visits to two brain surgeons, they concluded brain surgery was necessary.

Apparently, last winter Bob had a

ski fall and unknowingly got a good bop on the head. A clot developed inside his skull and after serveral months began putting pressure on the brain necessitating surgery. A five inch "plug" was cut from his skull and the clot removed. Several days later he was rushed back to surgery when a "cat" scan showed the clot had reformed - what the doctors called a "very unlikely occurrence."

In near record time after the second operation Bob was back home and due to return to work at end of June.

Bob, because you run so many hardto-manage trips, the Knee has often said you kneed your head examined but I never expected you to take me so seriously!

On to other news: Charlotte Reith is recently back from Seattle and a cruise on the inland passageway.

Knox Felker's first "professional" run was the PVS Fun Run in June. He enjoyed it so much that our leader Dick Clark persuaded him to run in a 10 k race with several hundred other racers. He finished first in his age group! He won a jogging suit and was recruited by PVS - that's Potomac Valley Seniors - a running club.

SKI TRIP updates

SEE & SKI AUSTRIA 1984 by Bob Wyckoff

Come and join us in our glorious 16-day (Jan 13 - 29th) Austrian Ski Adventure. We are already half full, but would like "you" to ski with us.

We fly into Zurich and spend our first seven days in the gemutlich, romantic MONTAFON VALLEYwith its excellent and varied skiing, located next to the Swiss border. If you choose to ski St. Anton in the Arlberg a day or two it is only I hour away by bus or train.

The second seven days we will spend in ZELL am SEE in the center of the "Europa/Sport Region" in Salzburger Land. This area provides a wide vsriety of skiing for all levels, including glacier skiing (KAPRUN). The areas both weeks include extensive cross-country trails. Also we stay in 4-star hotels both weeks.

In addition to these two weeks of skiing we will include visits to Innsbruck, Salzburg, and Munich.

"PVS SWITZERLAND" SKI TRIP Jan. 20 - Feb. 4. 1984 by Gorman Young

All land package and air arrangements and prices are the same as announced in the flyer enclosed with the June TOOT.

As of mid-June the trip is about two thirds filled with promises from enough others to fill our reservation quota of 24 beds. After our quota is sold out, which we expect to happen soon, we can still try for a few more rooms for late comers. This is a very popular time period as it is the last two weeks of "low season" hotel prices - also airline seats may fill up early for the same reason. Our advice is - don't delay if you are considering going on this trip.

Cancellation Policy:

\$35 reservation fee:nonrefundable.

Land package - no charge if cancelled prior to Dec. 5th. After that refunds are at the discretion of hotels unless a substitute is found.

Air passage - no charge if cancelled prior to 15 days before departure; after that a charge of 25% of the total air fare unless a certification by a doctor of illness or disability in which case there is no charge.

Lift Passes:

Cost of a 6 day all lift pass at Zermatt is \$85. At Verbier, \$95. Persons over 60 half price - so we are told.

Swissair provides complimentary head sets for movies and music and alcoholic beverages in flight.


