TRIP LEADER GUIDELINES:

Because there has been some confusion concerning PVS trip leaders' financial responsibilities, a committee consisting of Dot Mills(Chairman), Sheldon Drews, Jean Heitchue and Dot Mason, drew up the following guidelines which the ExCom, at their May meeting, voted to accept as PVS policy:

The general PVS responsibility is that members making reservations for events are responsible for the cost unless cancelling prior to the

announced deadline date.

The approximate cost and the cancellation date should be stated for all events.

For events for which the club treasury makes a deposit:

\* The payment required for a reservation should cover all fixed expenses

and part of variable expenses (food, transportation, etc.).

\* After the cancellation date a refund should be granted only if the member cancelling finds a replacement, if the event is filled, or if the ExCom authorizes the refund.

\* Normally, there should be only one free trip for a leader.

\* Details of rules for specific events should be worked out between the trip leader and the club president.

For events where no deposit is necessary the trip leader should make

rules at his own discretion.

The dinner is no longer entirely pot luck and, although more work for the hosts, the idea of serving a single entree is very successful (and a lot less work for the rest of us!). Don stirred up a tasty brown sauce to complement the excellent beef roast from Pat's oven. Guests contributed side dishes according to the menu selected by Pat. The scallop mousse was new to me; suffice to say that the Kuffs and Mairs should add this to our cookbook.

Don's wine selections, as always, were appropriate to the occasion. Three each of red and white satisfied everyone's preferences. I liked them all, finding the Chardonnay and the Burgundy especially pleasing. The delicate crystal stemware added just the right complement to the wines!

The crisp rain-scented air enhanced appetites as the guests were served a wicked strawberry punch out on the patio. Forty fortunate dinner guests were next ushered past tables laden with banana-pineapple cake, cheese cake, rum cake and kahlua pie, to be seated at cozy gingham covered tables, each with a dewey fresh rose for centerpiece.

The setting was an appropriate background for the mousse of scallop served on a bed of bibb lettuce and covered with rich watercress-mayonese sauce. Next came plates of tenderloin of beef. It was, more accurately, a beautiful presentation of delicately cooked tenderloin with brown sauce, chilled asparagus spears in a raspberry vinagrette, and elegant twice-baked potatoes. Fresh bread and a wonderful selection of wines, ranging from a chilled crisp white for the scallops and imported reds to complement the entree, all served to make one feel that this was dinner at a charming French country inn.
