

SNOWSHOE by SPECIAL BUS

You can avoid the 5-6 hour drive to Snowshoe, West Va., by joining a planned bus trip for January 16-18. Cost: \$145 a person (two to a room) or \$115 (four to a room). Cost includes bus, lift tickets and lodging, but not meals. Contact Shirley or Paddy Frucht evenings (765-3803) for more information. Space is extremely limited so, if interested, call now.

SNOWSHOE HOUSE

Anyone interested in participating in a trip to Snowshoe during January or February, contact Bob Barry after 7 p.m. (560-3127). He has access to a townhouse on the mountain adjacent to the slopes that sleeps 8-10. Cost for 5 days or longer is about \$140 a day so cost per person would depend on number participating.

SPAIN AND NORTH AFRICA - 1982

Bob and Mary Lee Grasley plan a real biggie for January '82. Says Bob, "This will be a 15 day trip with the first stop in Spain for a week of skiing in the Sierra Nevada. The second week will be in Morocco with skiing in the Oukaimeden (High Atlas) and Ifrane (Moyen Atlas) areas. Oukaimeden claims the world's highest chairlift (the télésiège de l'Ouka).

"The general itinerary: Washington - N.Y. - Casablanca - Sierra Nevada - Ifrane - Marrakesh - Oukaimeden and return to N.Y. via Casablanca. After arrival in Casablanca, all travel to and from ski areas will be by motor coach except for the short stretch of the Mediterranean between Tangier and Spain which will be by ferry

or hydrofoil.

"Sierra Nevada was the site of a very successful PVS trip in '78. The Alhambra, one of the world's outstanding sightseeing attractions, is on our route. In Morocco, we will visit 3 of the 4 "Imperial Cities", Fez, Meknes, and Marrakesh. (The other one is Rabat.) These ancient cities provide some of the few remaining opportunities to see a civilization almost unchanged for centuries.

"Marrakesh, with a view of the gleaming snows of Djebel(Mount)
Toubkal - the highest point in the Atlas Mountains is a most scenic

and fascinating city."

Promises to be a great see and ski trip. More details later.

PROFILE

The Amazing Masons by Lu Beale

Dot and Jenckes Mason have been PVSers only 2 years but already have made names for themselves as leaders of 3 hugely successful hikes in the Blue Ridge followed by equally successful dinners at their country hide-away near the Shenadoah River.

Few skiers enjoying these events would guess that Jenckes, a retired U.S. Forest Service Director, and Dot, also an ex-Forest Servicer, between them have chalked up 56 years of downhill fun.

Serious skiing for Dot, a native of Manchester, N.H., began in the late 30's when Hannes Schneider opened his Austrian-dominated ski school at North Conway. Dot, whose first job in the Forest Service was as a lookout in a fire tower overlooking the Cranmore ski area, invested \$10 in boots and skis, took some lessons, and was indelibly stamped with the Arlberg Technique.

Later she moved to Washington and, in 1948, joined SCWDC where she eventually became Editor of the Bulletin, a Board Director, Club Historian, and Head of Public Relations.

Meanwhile, Jenckes, Chicago-born, and a 1925 graduate in Forestry from the University of Michigan, joined the Forest Service immediately after graduation. He worked in western Washington for 20 years before transferring to Washington in '44 as Director of the Division of Timber Management which job he held until retirement in '67.

Out west, Jenckes first skied on Mt Hand in 1938 and he occasionally returned to western slopes when on business trips from Washington. But he felt he was getting no where (on skis, that is) until, in 1964, he bought Head skis and had his first real lesson on Mt. Tremblant. From then on it was Ski Heil! all the way.

Dot and Jenckes met over the water cooler- so to speak, when they had nearby offices in the Washington Bureau of the Forest Service. Jenckes, widowed in '64, married Dot in '66, joined SCWDC in '67 and the two began those ski trips which have taken them 8 times to Europe and countless times West - almost yearly to Aspen which, of all areas, remains their truest love.

In all these years the Masons have suffered only one serious injury - a cracked rib for Jenckes at Sun Valley in '78. But time, says Dot, is taking its toll and "parts of the anatomy are not holding up the way they used to."

But, slowing down? Not so you would notice. In the off-ski season, the Masons are still to be found in the mountains. Only last month they went west and hiked a trail in Washington that Jenckes himself blazed in 1925. Besides hiking with the Potomac Appalachian Trail Club, (Dot, in 1959, was its first woman president), the Masons have hiked in Norway, Switzerland, Austria and Italy and have led numerous Western wilderness backpacking trips.

How do they keep busy otherwise? Well, Dot's hobbies are cooking and knitting and Jenckes are keeping the wood bin filled and making improvements on their country house.

Dot is chairwoman of the Md.and D.C. section of Forest Wives. Jenckes is a Fossil - a club of retired men which meets monthly in Bethesda. He chairs the Science and Tchnology group, putting out a monthly report on their speciality.

What else? Oh, they square dance once a month, help maintain PATC trails, and visit Jencke's 2 children and 5 grandaughters - (his son, a world famous cardiologist in Cal., his daughter, a lawyer's wife in Larchmont, N.Y.)

And what do they do with the little ones? Take them skiing, naturally. Where? Aspen, of course. Why? Can you think of a better way of life?
