





TRIP QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS

The results of our Trip Questionnaire have been assembled. PVS trips are clearly an important subject given that a large majority of our members responded. Herewith the results:

- 1. PVS trips are highly rated in an absolute sense and in comparison to trips of other clubs and group tours. While the questionnaire provided ample opportunity for people to vent their frustrations and express their complaints, very, very few materialized. The great majority of comments and responses were exceedingly favorable.
- 2. Our people like the way the club manages trips. Basically, the trip leaders operate on their own pretty much as individual entrepreneurs. The club has very little direct involvement with the running of trips unlike other clubs which operate much more bureaucratically.
- 3. A highly significant majority prefer to go first class and say they are willing to pay for it. In fact, high economy is of relatively low priority. The more important considerations appear to be: slopeside accomodations, nice accomodations, direct flights and apres ski activities as a part of the trip. Future trip leaders take note!!
- 4. The use of a post-trip evaluation form is favored by a large majority. Makes sense if we are to improve upon the good and weed out the not-so-good. Dina Taylor has taken the lead to draft an evaluation form for ExCom to review.
- 5. The West was the winner in the "Where would you like to ski?" department with Europe not far behind. Interestingly, on the local scene, Seven Springs was highly favored. Anybody interested in running a Seven Springs trip this season?
- 6. Most PVS trip takers would just as soon leave the driving (and leading) to someone else. They don't have the time and don't want the bother of trip leadership. There were a number of people, however, who expressed interest in leading trips and we know who you are! Seriously, your expression of interest has been noted and we encourage you to come forward. Note the comment above regarding Seven Springs. Also, think about leading non-ski trips Longwood Gardens, anyone? I believe our veteran trip leaders would be more than willing to share their knowledge and lessons-learned with new leaders. Any interest in a half-day seminar type of exchange between new and veteran leaders?

ADDENDUM BY PRESIDENT JAN MARX:

As Reg, noted, we will be introducing a post-trip evaluation form for all of our ski trips this coming season. Since we want to continue to get your preferences on "where would you like to ski?", space for providing this information is made on the annual membership renewal form in this issue of TOCT.

All in all, this has been a very worthwhile effort and we as a club can only profit from the experience. I want to thank our past president, Sheldon Drews, under whose leadership the idea for a trip committee orginated. Also, many thanks to those who served on the committee Chairman Reg Heitchue, Norm Engelman, Knox Felker, Ray McKinley, Gail Pease, Charlotte Reith, Dina Taylor, Bob and Margaret Wyckoff.
