DIRECTIONS:

Take #495 to Tysons Corner where take Rte 7 to Reston. Make left turn onto Rte 606 - Baron Cameron. (Before the turn there's a large Reston sign on the right side of the highway.) Take a left turn at the first light onto Whiele Avenue. Continue to deadend, turn left onto Sunrise Valley Dr. At top of hill turn right at 1st traffic light onto South Lakes Dr. Go past shopping center on right and turn at first left onto Ridge Heights Rd. Take first right onto Owl's Cove Lane, go to end and park in cul-de-sac. 2146 is at the bottom of steep driveway.

A faster way is by the Dulles Toll Road at \$1.50 round trip. For this route, take Beltway #495 to Virginia Exit 12 Dulles Toll Road, Rte 267. Pass through the toll booths, 50c. Exit at #4, Whiele Ave, pay 25¢ toll. Turn left onto Whiele Avenue and proceed as directed above.

COOK'S CORNER

As Ray McKinley is fond of saying, "The chili hike was just another boring PVS event.".... which is, of course, not

true. The hike was fun and as usual, the food was delicious. Three of the offerings are presented below. They would all be great to use during the holidays.

TACO DIP Janet Waln

Preheat oven to 350*.

In medium bowl, mix together:

- 2 (8 oz.) cream cheese
 - (Janet uses Light Philly)
- 1 (1 1/4 oz.) package taco seasoning

Spread on bottom of two pie plates or in 9" X 13" baking dish. On top of cream cheese mixture, pour:

- 1 (15 oz.) can chili without beans (Janet uses Hormel)

On top of this mixture, layer:

- 1 cup cheddar cheese, grated
- 1/2 cup chopped black olives
- 1/4 cup chopped scallions

Bake in 350* oven for 30 minutes. Serve with corn chips or tortilla chips.

Liz Triau brought a delicious Summer Pecan Pie. It tastes just as well or better in the winter. The recipe given will make one 10-inch pie. Liz doubled the recipe for the chili hike and baked it in a 9" X 13" baking dish.

SUMMER PECAN PIE Liz Triau

Beat until stiff: - 3 egg whites

Beating continuously until mixture is thick and glossy, gradually add:

- 1 cup sugar

Mixing gently, but thoroughly, add:

- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 16 Ritz crackers, crushed
- 3/4 cup finely ground pecans
- 1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring

Spoon into buttered pie plate. Bake at 350* for 30 minutes. Cool. Spread with Cool Whip or whipped cream. Refrigerate for several hours before serving. Serves 6 - 8. Large rectangular pan makes 15 large servings or 20 small ones.

BUTTER PECAN CHEESECAKE Nancy Garrett

Combine, mixing well:

- 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup butter or oleo, melted
- 1/3 cup finely chopped pecans

Reserve 1/3 cup. Firmly press remainder on bottom of 9-inch springform pan. Chill while preparing filling.

Beat until light and fluffy:

- 3 (8 oz.) packages cream cheese

Beating well, gradually add: - 1 1/2 cups sugar.

Add, one at a time, beating after each: - 3 eggs

Add, mixing well:

- 1 (16 oz.) carton sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon butter flavoring
- 1 cup pecans

Spoon into prepared pan. Sprinkle with reserved mixture. Bake at 475* for 10 minutes. Reduce temperature to 300* and bake for an addition 60 - 75 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool to room temperature on wire rack. Chill.


