

Remember when...? How easy it is to conjure up fond memories when the subject of our attention is Hank Thomas. An easy, recent memory is Hank, relaxing waist deep in the Elrod's Jacuzzi, elbow propped on the edge holding an aluminum beverage can, and bantering with all who passed by. For those of us who knew him only through PVS, he has alway been there—literally. Hank was a Charter Member and it's fifth President, serving the club he helped to organize.

Helping and serving are important words when remembering Hank for he spent much of his time doing both. As a skier, he was one of the early ski patrollers, working the "big" mountains—Arapahoe Basin—three days per week while he pursued his college degree at the University of Colorado in Boulder. That same helpful spirit was there in the early 70's when he greeted us in front of the lodge at WISF—me with a young man less than one year old in my Gerry Carrier after a run down Squirrel Cage.

A crowded room was never lonely when Hank was present. His gregarious nature and booming voice were infectious. He had at least one story for every occasion ranging in subject matter from his career at the U.S. Weather Bureau (where he helped create those winter gnow storms that permit us to partake in our favorite activity), to his skiing adventures (did you know that he spent a year with his leg in a cast—in 1958—to heal a triple spiral fracture?), to the trials of mowing his private ski slope in his yard in Bowie.

Hank referred to himself periodically as a member of the "metallic" generation (you know that joke) but gold and silver are not the words that spring first to my mind. Instead, I classify him as a "gem;" a rare friend whom we all will miss.

A new ski area "WHITE TAIL" will open up for the 91/92 ski season. It is located near Mercersburg, PA (10 miles West of Hagerstown) 90 min. from Washington. It features: 935 ft vertical drop & 100% snowmaking. Lift chairs: 1 high speed detachable quad, 2 quads and 1 double. Total uphill capacity: 8,800 skiers/hour.

The BRSC 1993 Western Carnival will be held in Aspen, price \$1090. Group Trips Unlimited, the only bidder, was awarded the contract.

COOK'S CORNER

September meeting at the home of Ken and Myra Evans provided lots of goodies that are absolutely grand.

Myra, as always, is most gracious in sharing several of those with us. One of the recipes (Baked Brie) was served to the ExCom and was consumed to the last crumb.

SHRIMP DIP

Cream together well:

- ¼ cup milk

- ½ cup mayonnaise

- 2 teaspoons horseradish

- 8 oz. package cream cheese

Add, mixing well:

- ¼ cup green onion

- 1/8 teaspoon tabasco

- Dash Worcestershire sauce

Add:

- 1 can (4 ½ oz.) shrimp (drained)

Place in serving dish and sprinkle with paprika. Serve with chips and/or crackers.

SAUSAGE BALLS

Mix together and shape into 1-inch balls:

- 1 lb. hot sausage

- 1 lb. sharp Cheddar cheese
(Myra uses Cracker Barrel Extra Sharp)

- 3 cups Bisquick

Place on ungreased baking sheet and cook at 350° about 15-20 minutes. About midway through cooking, flip them so they cook evenly on both sides. Recipe can easily be doubled for a crowd.

When I bake these, I grate the cheese in the food processor. Then add the sausage and Bisquick using the plastic blade for mixing. I would do this for only one recipe at a time.

BRIE BAKED IN PUFF PASTRY

- I wedge or round of Brie (1-2 1bs.)

 1 package frozen puff pastry shells, defrosted

- 1 egg, lightly beaten

Roll out one pastry shell to about ½ inch thickness. Cut the pastry in a shape to totally enclose the cheese. Enclose the cheese, brushing the edges with egg to seal if necessary. Use any leftover puff pastry to make decorative cutouts if desired. Brush with egg and bake in center of oven preheated to 3500 for 25-30 minutes or until pastry is golden brown. Serve with apple or pear slices or crackers.

NOTE: WHILE THE CHEESE SHOULD BE BAKED JUST PRIOR TO SERVING, THE PASTRY CAN BE ROLLED AND THE CHEESE COVERED UP TO 2 DAYS IN ADVANCE.

HOT ARTICHOKE DIP

Chop and mix together:

 1 (8 ½ oz.) can artichoke hearts, drained

 1 (6 oz.) jar marinated artichoke hearts drained

Distribute over bottom of baking dish or 9-inch pie plate.

Sprinkle mixture lightly with garlic salt.

Scatter over top of artichokes:
- 1 (4 oz.) can diced green chilis

Over chilis, spread:

- 6 Tablespoons mayonnaise

Sprinkle with:

- 2 cups grated Cheddar cheese

Cover. Bake in 350° oven about 20 minutes or until hot and bubbly.

Can be made ahead and chilled until ready to bake. Cooking time will be extended to about 30 minutes if chilled.
