Stay on it for about five miles. At the seventh stop light turn right onto Herald Harbor Road (Texaco and Gulf stations at intersection). At first stop sign turn left (still Herald Harbor Road). Follow winding street past Herald Harbor Mini-Mart and Fire Station, make no unnecessary turns. A sign indicates when it becomes Long Point Road; continue for ½-mile to 256, on your left.

It was a warm and muggy evening as 12 PVSers and guests made a trek to the outback to visit the Waddick Station in Alexandria. We were warmly greeted at the corral by the dingo Jondi and the gracious hosts, head Ringer John and his Jill-a-roo, Dorie.

The lucky dozen were soon being introduced to a new experience and lexicon in the wine tasting arena. Tried any Long Flat White or Red or Coonawarra Cabernet Sauvignon lately? If not, you may be missing a good bet.

A new taste for most was a Shiraz 85 from Best Great Western Vineyards.

A number of participants thought this simple but very pleasant wine may have stolen the show from the world class Penfolds Cabernet Sauvignon and Grange Heritage. However, by this point in the evening, some tasters' objectivity had been called into question, especially that of former PVSer Marvin Stephens who had attended a Virginia wine growers tasting earlier in the day.

Each wine was accompanied by an appropriate tid bit from the hosts' kitchen and there was no question that these were world class and candidates for the next PVS cookbook. For example, dessert samplings included creme de cacaoflavored tarts and luscious lemon cream-filled strawberries to accompany a Peter Lehmann- Botrytis Semillon Sauterne. The last of several delicious cheeses accompanied an excellent Port (Yalumba Clocktower) after which we all departed with no thought of the humidity or the kangaroos. Many thanks, Waddicks!

COOK'S CORNER

The cook took a vacation this summer, but now September is here and I am back, ready to bring lots of special recipes

to you. The star this month is from a friend of Lu Beale's who was served a marvelous cookie at Neiman Marcus. She asked if the recipe was available, was told yes, but that there would be a charge of two-fifty. That seemed reasonable, so she took the recipe. When the bill came, it was for \$250. She feels she paid enough to provide it to everyone she knows. Lu very kindly shares it with us. I hope you will share it with all your friends.

NEIMAN'S \$250 COOKIE RECIPE Lu Beale

Cream together:

- 2 cups butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups brown sugar

Add:

- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

Mix together with:

- 4 cups flour
- 5 cups blended oatmeal (measure and blend in blender to powder)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda

Add:

- 24 oz. chocolate chips
- 1 8-oz. grated Hershey chocolate bar
- 3 cups chopped pecans or walnuts

Roll into walnut-size balls. Place 2" apart on cookie sheet. Bake at 375* for 6 minutes. Place on wire rack to cool. Makes 112 cookies. Recipe can be halved.

SUMI SALAD

skillet, saute until In browned:

- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1/2 pkg (2 1/2 oz.) sliced almonds
- 1/4 cup sesame seeds Set aside until cool.

Finely shred:

- 1 head cabbage with core removed

Finely chop and add to cabbage:

- 2 bunches green onions

Add to cabbage and onions: - 1/4 cup sunflower seeds

Whip together until dissolved:

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup rice vinegar

Add to vinegar mixture:

- 1 cup oil (half olive half vege)
- Seasoning packets from 2 packages Ramen oriental soup (chicken flavor)
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon salt

Just before serving, add almonds to cabbage mixture. Crumble noodles from Ramen soup packages. Add dressing. Mix together well. If you have left over, add sunflower seeds for crunch.

SPICY BEEF SPREAD

In large skillet, brown and drain:

- 1 lb. ground beef (fine grind)
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 large cloves garlic, minced

Add and cook on low for 10 minutes:

- 1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 2 Tablespoons catsup
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano

Skim off any fat that may surface.

Add and stir until melted:

- 1 (8 oz.) package cream cheese
- 1/3 cup parmesan cheese

The next recipe is a new and different Serve hot in chafing dish. Best with sesame crackers.
