PVS - BYOB (Bring Your Own Book) group


Traveling these days? Take a book! Then come back and tell us about what you read at our monthly Zoom BYOB gathering! Don't forget that our PVS guy friends are encouraged to stop by too! See the info at the bottom for how to join in on May 12th, 2022 (the second Thursday of each month) at 4 pm!

Here are the books we shared in April:

- <u>Marianne Soponis</u> decided to lighten things up by getting absorbed in "The Night Fire" by prolific author Michael Connelly whose signature character, Detective Harry Bosch, acknowledges that he's getting on in years by taking on a new crime-solving partner in this latest thriller.
- <u>Jan Marx</u> told us about "The Horsewoman" by James Patterson who shares authorship with Mike Lupica. This thriller centers on a family of show-jumping horse owners in Florida and the high-stakes competition and threats that pit family members against each other.
- <u>Karen Knopes</u> read the bestseller "Cloud Cuckoo Land" by Anthony Doerr. The unusual plot links the stories of 5 characters from the 1400s to the future all related to an apocryphal Greek myth by Diogenes. <u>Karen</u> also discussed a personal favorite: "Underland: A Deep Time Journey" by Robert McFarland which details in "poetic prose" his 10 years in underground and underwater places around the globe both beautiful and terrifying.
- <u>Ingrid Dallaire</u> turned to a fictionalized history of the very real and accomplished assistant to J.P. Morgan in Maria Benedict's "The Personal Librarian." Belle da Costa Greene who passed as white in the early 1900s and created the Morgan Library in New York. Her feat is even more noteworthy knowing the difficulties and the secret she overcame.
- Nancy McKinley brought "If I Had Your Face," debut novel by Frances Cha. Cha follows 4 young
  women in Seoul, South Korea as they navigate a world that defines success by strict beauty
  standards for women and where the entrenched patriarchy works against women trying to make
  their own way.

Drinkwater and Douglas Lundgren, were both eligible as Associate Members (associate members are those whose primary residence is more than 75 miles from Washington, DC).


Bob Jablon moved to approve the two for membership, Tom Tycz seconded the motion, and the motion passed without dissent. The gathering clapped for all in welcome.

## SKI TALK

#### MAY 2022

You may have seen the recent New York Times article about the removal of trail maps at ski resorts. Resorts are drastically cutting down on printing these maps. For example, the Aspen resorts printed 30,000 maps this year while in past years they had printed ten times as many-300,000! I was wondering why I couldn't find trail maps when we were in Snowmass this year. Fortunately, I brought one from past years with me. Some resorts are no longer printing any trail

maps at all and expect people to get them on their smart phones. Have you ever taken off your gloves in windy, snowy conditions to open your phone and search for a map ap? It is much easier pulling some paper out of your pocket, but the resorts are trying to save money any way they can. I had collected many maps over the years but in a frenzy of cleaning a few years ago I threw them away. I figured I could always get a new copy when I returned to a resort. So, hold on to any trail maps you have. You may never get another copy.

How did most of these maps come into being to begin with? We can thank the legendary ski artist named James Niehues, who has just been inducted into the U. S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame. He has drawn over 260 skiresort maps in his 30-year career. They include maps of our local areas like WISP, Ski Liberty and Massanutten as well as areas in New England, the Rockies, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Chile and elsewhere.


Mr. Niehues, who retired last year, said that his maps aren't just about "guiding you down the mountain but showing you its potential and what it offers." To convey that, he created three-dimensional scenes with meticulously rendered details. "I really kept the skiers in mind and tried to make it as realistic as I could," he added. "I always felt that it was important to show the terrain, the surroundings, the trees."


If you like to look at ski maps, you may be interested in the book: **The Man Behind the Maps**. published by Open Road Ski Company. It gives the history and a description of making ski maps. It includes photos of every one of his maps. It is a beautifully illustrated coffee-table book. You can spend hours studying the maps and dreaming of years past. Thank you, Mr. Niehues.

As ski areas were closing in April, the snow kept falling. There was abundant snow for spring skiing this year. There was even an inch or two of fresh powder the day Snowmass closed. 
