Roosevelt Island Hike Organized by Rosemary Schwartzbard 10/15/22

On a beautiful, crisp October morning, my friend Peggy, Rosemary, and I joined a National Park Service volunteer and a woman from London on a hike through Roosevelt Island. We visited the plaza where the 17-foot statue of Theodore Roosevelt greeted us. From there we continued our hike around the lush island, which is known for its variety of birds, wildflowers and diverse vegetation. We learned about the rich history of the island. During the Civil War troops were trained there. John Mason had a large house and farm on the island around 1796. A ferry reached the island from Georgetown and a causeway was built to the island from Virginia. We walked the boardwalk over the marsh viewing ducks, exotic birds and views of the Kennedy Center, Watergate, and Georgetown. Throughout the hike our guide gave us details about the history of the island and stories about Teddy Roosevelt. It became Roosevelt Island in the 1930s when the memorial was built and dedicated. The National Park Service maintains the island. Thank you for organizing, Rosemary.

SKI TALK November 2022

Tom Tycz, Kathy Lake, and Barry Lake attended the semi-annual BRSC meeting the end of September. This is a semi-annual business meeting where representatives from all the local ski clubs meet and vote on future ski destinations. The task of finding ski resorts that will accommodate groups seems to be getting harder because of limited hotel rooms and/or air availability. The airlines have cut some routes to the resorts. Also, the cost keeps going up making some resorts too prohibitive for some of the clubs. The 2024 Western Carnival was supposed to go to Whitefish or Snowbird. But air and cost were issues.

BLUE RIDGE SKI COUNCIL (BRSC)

Here is a rundown of the BRSC ski trips for 2023 and 2024:

- <u>2023 Western Carnival: Crested Butte</u> (January 28-February 4) run by Winter Ski and Sport. PVS is not participating in this trip but if you want to go you can go with another ski club. Seven clubs are participating.
- <u>2023 Eurofest: Club Med, Val d'Isere</u> (March 12-23) run by Encompasse Tours. A group from PVS will be joining this trip led by Kathy and Barry Lake. Four clubs in addition to PVS are going on this trip.
- **2023 Winterfest: Lake Placid, NY** (March, 2023.) The planning committee says the hotel at Lake Placid is first class.
- **2024 Western Carnival: Lake Tahoe, CA** (February 3-10, 2024.) This trip will be run by Doug Horstman of Encompasse Tours. Most of the events would be held in Heavenly. Groups will fly to Reno. No decision has been made if PVS will participate in this trip. If you are interested in going and/or leading, let me know.
- <u>2024 Eurofest: Kitzbuhel, Austria</u> (March 15-23, 2024.) Ski.Com will be running the trip. More information will be coming.
- 2024 Winterfest: Tremblant, Canada March more information will be coming.

It was mentioned at the BRSC meeting that Whitetail and Ski Roundtop (Vail properties) need ski instructors and retail people. The pay is \$20 per hour plus ski lessons if anyone is interested. This would be a great way to improve your skiing.

Also, in 2025 Alpine X, an indoor ski facility, will be opening in Lorton. It will be bigger than the one in Dubai!

Always reading! A congenial group of PVS readers meet once a month to share the latest book each of us has had on the bedside table. Consider joining us on Zoom on the 2nd Thursday of each month. Here's what we discussed in October:

Karen Knopes spoke about "The Last Painting of Sara de Vos," historical fiction by Dominic Smith. It was a "good read" set in Amsterdam in the 17th century. A painting by a fictional (but very believable) woman artist becomes the center of drama in different centuries with artist guilds, women, the tulip bulb disaster, thefts, and forgeries – always able to keep you involved in the story!

Bonnie Sweeney brought us "The Vanishing Half" by Brit Bennett, a best-seller published in 2020. The story is about twin African American sisters who lived in poverty, lost their father, became inseparable, and eventually left home to discover the world. They took different paths depending on the shade of their skin and had varied experiences. HBO plans to produce a series from the book.

Jan Marx told us about a "friendly kind of book" with a not-so-friendly title: "Murder at the Blueberry Festival" by Darci Hannah, part of a series of mysteries set around a lighthouse in Michigan. Jan told us about a blue-tooth amplifier that enables listening to books on cell in the car.

Marianne Soponis has been reading "Lessons from the Edge" the memoir by Marie Yovanovitch, former US Ambassador to Ukraine, who famously testified with grace in Donald Trump's impeachment inquiry. Her stellar diplomatic career in hot spots around the world was brought to a halt by a smear campaign that removed her from her post in Ukraine.

Nancy McKinley discussed "A Separation" by Katie Kitamura. The novel is full of symbolism while telling a tale of a broken marriage and the search for the missing husband in Greece. The wife in the story moves through life passively accepting each event wrought by others who move with passion.

A FEAST FOR THE EYES AND PALATE A TOUR FROM LA TO SAN FRANCISCO THROUGH BIG SUR JULY 2022

We had been talking for several years to our son Mark and daughter-in-law Amanda, who live in LA, about going on a trip with them from LA to San Francisco through Big Sur. Due to mudslides, fires, road closures, Covid and work schedules we had just about given up on the idea when we got a call in early July from Mark asking if we were still interested and available in a week or so. We jumped on it and had plane reservations before they could say Big Sur. We got to LA a day later than expected due to a flight cancellation. While we missed a night in LA, we got on our way up the coast when Mark and Amanda picked us up at the airport in a comfortable minivan.

Le Tour Begins

Our first stop after our flight was the **Carhartt** winery tasting room in Los Olivos, near Santa Barbara for a sampling of five wines! By this time we were fully into vacation mode. We drove for a couple more hours to a small town called **Los Alamos**. We checked in to the **Alamos Motel**, which was surrounded by a little park and lots of cactus. After settling in, we walked across the street to **Bell's** Restaurant for our prix fix five-course dinner (for \$75). The lovely courtyard and French waiter transported us to Europe. Our first course was Sea Urchin caught the previous day by a local diver! The lettuce was picked that morning; the meat was from a local cow, as was the cream in our dessert. Fabulous dinner! How could this happen in a town only two blocks long. Oh, and did I mention, Bell's has one Michelin star?

After breakfast the next morning at a local bakery, we were on our way. We stopped at the **Madonna Inn** in San Luis Obispo to see this over-the-top restaurant and event space with lavishly decorated pink rooms. We then made a stop at **Morro Bay** to see the famous Morro Bay Rock. We were able to catch a glimpse of the volcanic rock through the fog, which kept coming and going. The views were spectacular. We made one more stop, in **Harmony**, a town boasting 19 people, a chapel and an ice cream truck. Of course, we had the ice cream.

We arrived in **Cambria** early enough in the evening to be able to wander through this delightful beach town, walk on the boardwalk and watch the surfers. It was cold and windy but our room at the **Cambria Beach Lodge** was cozy, with a gas fireplace that instantly warmed us. We could sit on the bed and look out our picture window to see the ocean. Dinner was at **Madeline's**, a lovely French restaurant in town.

The next morning, after a walk on the boardwalk and a quick breakfast, we were off to **Hearst Castle** at San Simeon, a few miles down the road. I'm not sure what I expected, but this is truly a magnificent castle built on top of a mountain, with fantastic views of the ocean and surrounding countryside. A bus takes you from the visitor center near the ocean up the mountain to the castle and back through a steep windy road reminiscent of being in the Alps. We took a tour of the Grand Rooms, the pools and gardens. It was a beautiful, sunny day and I was transported back in time, fanaticizing being a guest at this magical estate where Hearst lived and entertained in the 30s and 40s.

There is another "must see" in San Simeon if you can go from the sublime to the silly. The **Elephant Seal Rookery** is located on the beach just down the road. These 2000-to-5000-pound seals are playful, funny, smelly, ugly and delightful. They come to the rookery to mate and give birth. They spend most of their life at sea but at any given time there may be hundreds on the beaches, especially in the summer. Volunteer docents wander among the tourists watching the seals. They give information and keep the crowd away from the seals, who are unpredictable and potentially dangerous, but so much fun to watch.

BIG SUR

Big Sur is a rugged, mountainous 80-mile stretch of road in Central California between San Simeon and Carmel. The mountains and the seashore make the views spectacular. Although there is not a real town, some shops, restaurants and hotels are scattered in the woods. We stayed two nights in Big Sur at two different Inns. The first night was spent at **Deetjen's Big Sur Inn**, which is a National Historic Site opened in the 1930s on the edge of a Redwood forest. Not much has changed from the 30s. Heat is provided by wood-burning stoves; there are no TVs, no phones, no Wi-Fi, and no locks on the doors! The restaurant where we had breakfast was warm and cozy, with fireplaces, candlelight and classical music. Walking through the edge of the forest near the Inn, statues of Buddha were found in crevices in the trees.

The next night we moved down the road to **Big Sur River Inn**, which also opened in the 30s. It overlooks Big Sur River and the most popular activity is to sit on a deck chair in the river and let the water ripple over your tired feet while sipping the drink of your choice. While this Inn was a little more modern than the first I described, it was also quite rustic.

We had two memorable dinners during our stay in Big Sur. The first night was at **Nepenthe**, a large restaurant located on the side of a cliff, with views of the ocean. Sipping wine on the deck while watching the sun go down over the ocean will be a memory I will keep forever. While the food was good, the setting was so spectacular, it is hard to remember what we ate. In addition to the restaurant, there is a huge gift shop. It was closed when we went to dinner so we had to stop by when it opened the next day. I was able to buy a warm wrap for the cool evenings.

The next night we ate at a small out of the way rustic restaurant and bakery, **Big Sur Bakery**. I do remember the surprisingly delicious dinner of fresh red trout, cooked to perfection, with a crisp skin. Each setting was unusual and memorable.

Our son is a cinematographer who has spent time in Big Sur shooting movies. Amanda is also very familiar with this area. They were able to take us to places not easily found. One unique spot was **Pfeiffer Beach** down a long narrow unpaved road surrounded by cliffs and grass and huge rocks. We visited several out of the way places including **McWay Falls**, a short hike from the highway. We even stopped for lunch at one of the few upscale resorts on Big Sur, **Alila**, where the rooms go for as much as \$2500 a night. Lunch was outdoor on the top of a cliff looking out over the ocean – again.

It was now time to end our stay in Big Sur and drive to Carmel, stopping along the way to see the views and take pictures. The most memorable was **Bixby Bridge**, probably the most popular spot to take photos on Highway 1.

CARMEL

We stopped in the charming town of Carmel for lunch and to see the beach, the galleries and shops. This is always a fun town to visit. It felt big and cosmopolitan after spending a couple days on Big Sur. From there we went to ...

SAN FRANCISCO

We checked into the Omni and spent the next six days in San Francisco. Amanda and Mark stayed for only two nights and then drove back to LA. I will list our memorable experiences without going into great detail, as this write-up is already too long.

- The Morris Restaurant a trendy place on Mariposa Street famous for whole smoked duck. Delicious!
- **Tadisch Grill** on California St. is a SF mainstay which has been open since 1849 and is the 3rd oldest restaurant in continuous operation in the US. It specializes in seafood.
- Top of the Mark in the Mark Hopkins Hotel on Nob Hill. Fantastic views of the city. Go for Happy Hour.

- Tommaso Restaurant Italiano on Kearny St. in North Beach, celebrating 80 years in business. Order the
- The Buena Vista on Hyde St. near Fisherman's Wharf has been open since 1916 and serves the best Irish Coffee and Ramos Fizzes around.
- Beach Chalet and Brewery on the beach near Cliff House for good food and views. Housed in an historic grainery with impressive murals on the walls.
- Hog Island Oyster Bar in the Ferry Building is a must visit. Order the Hog Island oysters.
- Hog Island farm in Marin County is a long drive over mountains but a great setting to get fresh, plump oysters.
- **Tiburon** is a 40-minute ferry ride from San Francisco. It boasts the shortest Main St. in the U. S., just two blocks long. Eat on the deck at Sam's Anchor Café and don't miss the trendy shops and very interesting museum. Or just sit on a bench and look at the bay and the modern houses on the cliffs.
