INTERNATIONAL DINNER RECIPES

Continuing our popular inclusion of recipes from the May 1977 International Dinner, we have four more recipes this month: two Entrees and two desserts. RECIPES ARE PUBLISHED UPON RECEIPT FROM OWNERS:

Recipe #7 PAELLA (Spanish Entree), by the Copes

Opening comment: Don does his by guess and by gorry — Really has no idea regarding amounts. But, here is the recipe as a starter:

Add 2 large pinches of Saffron to 5 cups of boiling chicken stock.

Reduce heat and hold at a simmer.

Saute: 6 pieces of chicken in 2 cup of Olive oil until nearly done.

Remove and keep warm.

Add: 2 crushed garlic cloves | Saute until 1 large chopped onion 5 transparent.

Add: 2 cups now rice, cook until golden

1 quart of stock 1 chopped tomato

1 tea-spoon of salt

peppex pimento

frozen peas sliced chorizo sausage (or kielbasa)

Cover and simmer until done (add stock as necessary) Kemove cover for last few minutes.

Add: cooked chicken cooked lobster cooked shrimp cooked mussells cooked clams

Whatever you feel you can afford!

Recipe # 8

Ratatouille (French Entree), by Billie Pease

Olive oil t lb zucchini medium eggplant ½ lb yellow onions 2 green peppers

2 cloves garlic, mashed

1 16 red ripe tomatos (due to season, / used a large can of Italian pear tomatos). Olive oil, parsley, basil, salt & pepper

Instructions: Wash and slice zucchini in about 4 inch slices. Peel and cut eggplant lengthwise resembling fat frenchfries. Place in a bowl and toss with a teaspoon of salt. Let stand for & hour. Slice onions, cut peppers into

strips; and peel, seed and chop the tomatos, while squeezing out the juice. Dry zucchini and egaplant on paper towels. Saute in hot olive oil one layer at a time until lightly browned; then set aside. Saute onions and peppers slowly until almost tender. Add garlic, salt and pepper, and place tomatos on top. Simmer covered for about five minutes. Then remove cover and turn up heat to boil off almost all of the juices.

Place alternate layers of 1/3rd of each mixture into a casserole, sprinkling with parsley and a little basil. Baste with the olive oil and juices from the skillet. Place uncovered in a 325° oven for 15 minutes, then tip and baste again with

juices. It may now be served hot, or cooled down to

room temperature. It is excellent re-heated later. The most important thing is to NOT overcook, but to allow vegetables to retain their texture and character. The olive oil imparts its distinctive

Recipe # 9

by Gail Gell Rum Cake $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped pecans (or walnuts) 1 box Duncan Hines yellow cake mix 1 package instant vanilla pudding cup rum cup water cup Wesson oil

eggs 1. Grease and flour angel food (or bundt) cake pan. Crumble nuts in bottom.

2. Put cake and pudding mixes in large bowl. Add rum, water, oil and eggs. Mix 2 minutes. Pour into cake pan. Bake at 325° for 50 - 60 minutes. 3. Remove from oven and immediately pour on hot rum mixture. Cool at least 30 minutes before removing from pan. Cake will be high and puffed up after baking but will gradually sink and become like a pound cake after hot rum mixture is poured

on it. 4. Hot rum mixture:

Recipe # 10

Cheese Cake. by Peggy Bwins

Le butter (1 stick) melted line 10"springform

2 lbs cream cheese 4 eggs, separated

1 cup sugar (and 2 tablespoons)

1 teaspoon varilla

2 tablespoons sugar Mix together for 1 teaspoon vanilla

the topping

beat in 27 sugar until stiff. (Refrigerate). Beat egg yolks in a large bowl until light wellow color. Add 1 cup sugar, vanilla and cream cheese Jo were matched against a top team from SCMDC cut into cubes. Beat until smooth. Fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into crumblined springform pan. Bake at 350 (not pre-heated) for 45 minutes. Remove cake from oven and allow to "rest" for five minutes. Spread sour cream topping mix over cheesecake and return to oven and bake another 15 minutes at 475°.

Cool cake in pan and refrigerate for at least several hours before serving. Serves 10 to 12.
