PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Are You Really a Complete PVSer?"

At the most recent Executive Committee (Excom) meeting we spent a considerable amount of time discussing membership. We discovered that many of you are not yet full members of PVS, even though you have been paying your dues for several years. You are still Applicant Members.

Our by-laws state that before anyone can become a full or "Active Member" of the club he/she must meet several requirements. First you must be invited to join by an active member. Then you must apply for membership and pay your dues. Then, apparently, comes the hard part. You must:

- a. Attend two club meetings.
- b. Ski with a club member three days.
- c. Pass the U.S.S.A. Basic Test or demonstrate equivalent ability.

We"ll be publishing the requirements of the Basic Test in one of the next issues of TOOT, but fundamentaly you must be able to control yourself on skis and do a stem turn. When you have met the requirements your name is brought up for a vote. Five negative votes are sufficient to deny full membership.

The purpose of these requirements is to assure that we remain "THE Club for Skiers"-- the only local ski club you have to be a skier to join (we do realize that this is a revolutionary idea -- we hope it will catch on. At a recent ski council meeting the President of a large local ski club told me that his club was not just a social group. He said "Why, nearly half of our members have been on skis). Finally, we support skiing and skiers and feel that skiers should be compatible with other skiers. Thats the reason for the final vote. I should point out that no one has been voted out of club membership in recent history.

To help the membership process, and our record keeping, we passed two resolutions at the last Excom meeting. As a result of this we will now be voting in new members at our April annual meeting. We will also have written ballots and the names of those who have fulfilled all of the requirements will be published in TOOT prior to the vote.

Are you uncertain as to whether you are an applicant member or have met the requirements? Call Gail Gell our membership chairperson (924-5000) to find out. If you are still an applicant, we urge you to try and meet the requirements for full membership by April.

I hope to see you all at the International Inn at Tysons Corner on the 20th. And applicants, don't forget, it can be one of your two required meetings.

Date: March 20, 1979


Time: 6:30 for Exotic Dishes 8:00 for Meeting & Movie

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# PVS SKI AUSTRIA 1979 by Rosemary Soler

The Wyckoff Ski Austria trip ended on a wildly ironic note when the last leg of our flight from Kennedy to Washington was cancelled due to the GREAT BLIZZARD of '79. One-thirty a.m. Feb. 19 found us scrambling frantically for the almost nonexistant cabs at Union Station, having caught the last Amtrak down from New York that night. The appearance at the station of Ray and Malle McKinley must have seemed like angels to some of the Virginia contingent they took home. We could have used alot of that now at Innsbruck!

The trip began with a day of rest in Munich with the usual visits to the Hofbrau Haus, Glockenspiel, Rathaus, etc. Then it was on to Innsbruck, the ancient city of the Tyrol, where its tolling bells awoke us every morning in time to meet our bus and take us to the ski area of our choice. The areas were varied in their degrees of difficulty and snow conditions. Our favorite was Axamer Lizum with its famous Olympic run, where because of the high elevation the snow conditions were superb. Others visited were Patscherkofel, the scene of another Olympic run, which was pretty "patchy" on the lower slopes, Mutters, a family area with gentle runs, but because of lower elevation was hard packed and icy and Seegrube, which according to the more adventurous members of the group (Larry Pease, Werner Koch, Connie Worley and Gail Gell) was icey and forbidding in its steepness. The last day in Innsbruck most of the group skied on a glacier which proved to have long beautiful runs, although light conditions were not the best, a condition we were slowly getting used to (ha! - do you ever?). Kitty Foy took advantage of some of the cross country ski tours and reported they were delightful.

Our hotel, the Grauer Bar, was strategically located right at the opening of the "old city" for shopping and right across the street from the Folk Art Museum, with its fantastic displays of all the implements of living of the peasants of the Tyrol and the Valley of the Inn River, going back to the 14th century and beyond. Numerous side trips were available of which the Bavarian Castle Tour of "Mad" King Ludwig was the most popular. Special parties in the evening consisted of a sledge ride, beer party, Tyrolean evening of yodelling and schuplattling.

The second week was spent in the most loved of all hotels and ski areas, the beautiful Alpenrose in Zurs. To those of us new to the area it was no disappointment. The hotel. with its fabulous artifacts was an antique lover's dream, not to mention the quality of the food with its interchangeable luncheon chits redeemable in the hotels of other ski areas. The snow conditions were as usual sehr gut! The runs over to Lech and Ober Lech, although on intermediate trails, were a bit tricky on the bottom due to ice. The return was easy, the skiing in Lech pleasant and the lunch at the Hotel Schneider lived up to its high recommendations. Two negative sides to the Arlberg scene, however, were the battle of the flat light by day vs. the feather puffs by night, and they came close to doing some of us in. When the sun did shine though, the slopes were pure gold.

Norm's Nomads (Norm Engleman, Alice Swalm, etc.) ventured out on a sunny day on a trek to St. Anton. On the first run from the top Norm spilled and when he collected himself he only had one of his new Blizzard skis with brakes yet! It was like the other had disappeared in thin air. All of us behind him saw nothing as we picked our way down - weird. Jac Hadler and Tony Soler worked their way down about 300 ft. to the side of the trail which fell off into a ravine of deep snow and it was by the tiniest telltale sign on top of the snow that Jac spotted it. Tony, after sinking to his knees, fished the completely submerged ski out. Meanwhile Norm, hopping around on one foot, perched on a mogul high on the Valluga slope, looking like "Big Bird" from Sesame Street, was still muttering "its weird". I guess this is a warning to all aficianados of ski brakes, that they can get you into deep trouble.

The trip's wundakind, Jan and Julie Wolfe, Patty Wyckoff and Johnny Steece had a blast and are all developing into great skiers, particularly Jan, who already skis like the wind.

The last day, after starting with an ominous cloud cover, became crystal clear and we all raced off to the Muggengrat Chair area where there is something for everyone, the snow is lovely, the scenery divine, and Lois Rose led us all a merry chase.
