HIKE OR BIKE OVER WILSON BRIDGE TO NATIONAL HARBOR FOR LUNCH
FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 11

An exciting new facility has opened in the area. There is now a pedestrian/bike path on the new (north) span of the Wilson Bridge. The path is wider than the typical bike path and there are three rest areas equipped with telescopes where you can stop and enjoy the fantastic views of Washington and Alexandria. The path connects with National Harbor, the new town center that has opened on the shore of the Potomac in Prince George's County. Join fellow PVS'ers on Friday, September 11, for a hike or bike ride over this path, followed by lunch at the National Harbor branch of McCormick and Schmick's. It is approximately 2.5 miles from the entrance to the



path on S. Washington St. in Alexandria to the National Harbor. Parking is available next to the bridge at Hunting Towers, 1204 S. Washington St., in spaces labeled "Reserved for Jones Point," where there are about 15 spaces. For a longer journey (the bikers), you can bike from home (as I will); park at the Marina that is between the airport and Alexandria; or park at Belle Haven Park about a mile south of the



bridge. I propose that the Hike group meet at 10:30 to walk over the bridge leisurely. The Bike group will meet at 11:15. Lunch will be at noon and then you will be free to go back over the bridge or to visit the shops at National Harbor. There is also ample paid parking at National Harbor if you only want to join us for lunch. Please sign up by September 7 so we can make appropriate arrangements. Further instructions will be sent once people sign up.

TRAVEL ALERT

Be aware that there are new travel requirements that you will have to comply with for the upcoming ski season. Under a new program, "Secure Flight", the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) requires the following:

1. When making flight reservations, you must provide your exact name as it appears on the ID you use to get on a flight, which means either a passport or driver's license. This will present no problem if your passport and driver's license are issued in the form you normally use when traveling.
2. You must also provide your date of birth and gender when buying tickets.

TSA has built in some flexibility for the near future but you should strive to obtain consistency between the name on your ID and travel documents.

Bob Marx Update

Bob Marx has been battling Myelodysplastic Syndrome (a Leukemia-like disease) since September 2008. Bob received a bone marrow transplant on April 30 after some months of chemotherapy. Since that time Bob and Jan have been staying in an apartment near the University of Minnesota Hospital. The main problem after this treatment is immune reaction to the the new blood cells and a counter reaction by the transplanted bone marrow cells. This is termed graft-versus-host (GVH) disease. There have been many good days but there have also been difficult days. Bob is now on the mend after a GVH episode in early August that caused problems in his intestines and his eyes. The GVH symptoms have passed but recovery from the episode is slow.

Jan provides updates from time to time on the Caring Bridge site. We all join her in hoping for continued progress with Bob's recovery
