Tutorial for the PVS Zoom Meeting Tuesday, November 17, 2020 at 7:30 p.m. EST

Understanding that there are different levels of experience with Zoom, below are some basics for our gettogether for those who might be helped by it.

Marianne Soponis is the Host of the meeting and, as such, will send the invitation and also open the meeting to participants. The information below refers to the evening of the meeting.

- The invitation will be sent via email. Open the email and look for the link that says, "Open Zoom Meeting." Click on it.
- When the link opens, look for "Open with Video." Click on it. (*Please Note: If your computer <u>does not</u>* have a camera, you can call in via your cell phone. You can be heard but won't be seen.)
- When the video appears, take a look to see how you look! Then, look for "Open with Audio." Click on it so you can be heard.
- If you come in too early, you may see the line "Please wait for Host to open the meeting." If you see this, it means Marianne hasn't started the meeting but should do so soon. Just wait and it will happen!

Once you are in the meeting, move your cursor to the bottom of the screen (if you are using a computer). If you are using an iPad, it will be at the top. You will see several things:

- "Mute/unmute" you can choose either by clicking on the words. If everyone is talking a lot, or outside noises interfere (siren, radio, pet), the Host can <u>mute</u> everyone and then ask people to unmute when they have something to say. To begin with, you will be un-muted so you can chat until everyone gets on the screen.
- "Video on/off" you should be able to see yourself and others. If you can't, click on the words to get the video on.
- # participants this shows how many of us are on the call and lists names.
- "Share screen" Right now, we won't use this.
- "Reactions" allows participants to give a thumbs up!
- 'More" If you click on this, "chat" comes up. It allows you to write comments or questions to everyone. It also says record but I was advised not to do that.
- "Leave"- please only do this at the end as you leave.

NASA Tree Project with Dorian Janney

Continuing Event

Five budding "citizen scientists" from the PVS ranks have begun a six-week virtual pilot program to learn more about trees in our area. In our first meeting by ZOOM on Oct. 16, Dorian Janney, our NASA Earth Science Education and Communications Specialist friend (and PVS, too) presented some videos and tools we can use to do our explorations.

First, she introduced us to StoryMap, with a video excerpt from her own property, walking and talking during a tour of her trees and their stories. She provided a number of online tools that we can use to identify trees and understand why leaves change color, and some art projects to do with colored leaves.

Our primary project for the next few weeks will be to use the NASA-sponsored free app called "GLOBE Observer". Its Trees tool allows us to measure selected

trees in our neighborhood with our smart phone and connect our data to NASA's ICESat-2 satellite. It then







contributes to NASA's Earth Science research program, which is looking at questions related to the carbon cycle, especially how forests, other vegetation and the ocean are absorbing carbon emissions.

SKI TALK November 2020



How life has changed in 7.5 months! I still remember the Before Time with great fondness. Little did I imagine after arriving home from Park City on March 14 how much our lives would change. It's a quieter, simpler life for sure. I am grateful for my health, the many books



available to read, and so much to watch on Netflix, HBO, and Prime. Having time to take care of our two-yearold grandson is a big plus. Spending many hours outside walking, kayaking, and biking has also been wonderful. This is the time of year I usually begin thinking about skiing and counting the days before we get to Snowmass. Since we are not planning trips out west or to Europe this season, we might want to rediscover local skiing. Our intrepid local ski leader, John Smith, is working on getting information. As you know, Vail Resorts now owns Pennsylvania's Liberty, Roundtop, Whitetail, Big Boulder, and Jack Frost; all of these areas are on the popular Epic Pass. Snowshoe, West Virginia, is on the popular Ikon Pass. I assume the local resorts will be following the same Covid rules that Vail has for its other properties, such as masks, reservations and take-out food.

Timberline Resort, West Virginia

You might want to consider another option this winter, Timberline Resort in Canaan Valley, West Virginia. Timberline was a popular ski resort for many years. However, after years of decay, it went bankrupt. In November 2019, it was bought by the owners of a small, family-run ski area in Indiana, Perfect North Slopes, a well-respected day ski area in a challenging weather climate. On March 26, 2020, Timberline Mountain announced \$10 million in capital improvements, with the majority of the money being spent on two brand new Doppelmayr chairlifts. The new lifts include a high-speed detachable 6-pack, as well as a fixed grip quad which will serve mid-mountain terrain. A surface conveyor is also expected to be installed at Timberline's learning area. They plan to focus on snowmaking upgrades in the near future. These upgrades are part of an ambitious plan to re-open Timberline for the 2020-2021 season.

Timberline enjoys colder temperatures and more natural snow than many Mid-Atlantic resorts. With a base altitude of 3,268 feet and a peak that tops out at 4,268 feet, in a good year Timberline can receive more than 150 inches of natural snow. With a modernized snowmaking system and a sufficient water supply, Timberline will be able to crank out manmade snow when other lower-altitude ski areas can't, which should help it secure earlier opening dates and a longer season.

You can get to Timberline from the Metropolitan DC area in about 2.5 hours. It may not be a day trip but you can drive and check out rental properties in the area. For more information see the following: http://www.dcski.com/articles/1614

Telluride (February 6-13, 2021)

The base cost of the BRSC trip to Telluride has dropped from \$1825 to \$1765. The social activities have been cancelled. Also, Southwest Airlines now flies from Dulles to Montrose non-stop. For more information contact: Effie Rubenstein sportours@comcast.net

In Memoríam Adele Harman Waggaman



Adele Harman Waggaman died September 26, 2020 in Washington, DC, just short of her 101st birthday. Adele was a PVS member from August 12, 1977 to June 30, 2011. She served on ExCom in 1980 and hosted club meetings in her home. The following is excerpted from her obituary on the Dignity Memorial website.

The heavens can expect a spicy, feisty, entertaining, elegant, funny, salty, gracious and ever beautiful addition to the hereafter. Though failing, she was still Adele near the end, clever, unbridled, demonstrative and strong. She was born October 21, 1919, in Orange, NJ, the second child of

Lillien and Archer Harman. She spent much of her early years at St. Paul's School in Concord, NH, where her father taught. In her teen years she enrolled at the Ethel Walker School in Simsbury, CT, where she attended her 80th reunion three years ago. Later at Bennington College, she honed her rebellious, rambunctious skills.

After a brief modeling career in New York, Adele married naval officer Arnold Welles in 1944. The marriage ended in divorce in 1948. In 1950 she married Foreign Service officer David LeBreton, who died in a drowning incident in 1953. When her beloved father died six months later, she was 34 and reeling, with three young boys. Happily, she found and married Robert Waggaman in 1957, a kind and generous Washington, DC and Nantucket fixture, who provided warmth, stability and a gentle nudge now and again to rein her in. Bob died in 1981. Adele and Bob had two children, bringing the household offspring to five kids from three different fathers — all in a sprawling and noisy Chevy Chase, MD home. It was a great testament to her deep conviction of the importance of family that this disparate group bonded and remained as one, with Adele as the cornerstone. She recently remarked that she could rarely have any houseguests in Edgartown, because "you kids were always there."

She loved Edgartown, MA where her grandparents brought her as a child. It was an extraordinary spot for wonderful extended family activity, where, for decades, there have been heated tennis games, beach shenanigans, touch football, celebrations, clambakes, and an odd assortment of dogs.

Adele had a passion for skiing, tennis, paddle tennis, her clunky bike, her collection of Nantucket baskets, bridge, salt, chocolate, opera, and the evening cocktail. She also enjoyed playing the piano, and during Christmas holidays could be persuaded to pull out her accordion and sing German folk songs.

Her passport was well worn. She spent extended periods of time in Germany, Tunisia, Paris, and South America. She traveled much of the world and generously hosted many extended family trips to far-off ski resorts, a particular joy for her and all involved.

Adele remained elegant and regal in manner and bearing until suffering a broken hip two years ago. The family is grateful that she in large part retained her amusing, opinionated personna. She led by dignified example, didn't sweat the small stuff, and was someone who truly grasped what mattered in life.

She is survived by sons Alexander Welles of Seattle, WA and Edgartown, MA, Arnold Welles of Greenwich, CT and Edgartown, David LeBreton of Dedham and Edgartown; a daughter Victoria Knopes of Chevy

Chase, MD and Edgartown; stepson MacKenzie Waggaman of Mt. Washington; a sister Elizabeth Brainard of Marion; 16 grandchildren and step-grandchildren and two great-granddaughters. A son, William Waggaman, died in 2018.

A memorial celebration will take place next summer.

A reminiscence from Bob Knopes

Adele sponsored my PVS membership about the time our son, Chris, and Adele's daughter, Victoria, were married. So we had more in common than skiing, including, later, three grandsons.

She was an active member of the club and an avid skier. We travelled on PVS trips to Steamboat Springs, Snowmass, Big Sky, and Cortina d'Ampezzo. Though we did not ski together (she preferred her long-time partners) Adele often joined Karen and me for drinks, lunch, or dinner when we had a free evening.

Adele skied into her late 80s. She often told of the time she fell getting off the chair lift, and could not get up. A "handsome young man" picked her up and set her safely to the side. She didn't consider hanging up her skis, but after that, she preferred getting to the slope by gondola.



Looking Back

As noted in the President's Message and Ski Talk sections of this TOOT issue, opportunities to ski during the 2020-21 season are different, if not limited. In this environment it seemed that it might be interesting to look back at the ski trips that PVS offered during the early days of the club's existence. Those offering, primarily small group trips of one to three days to local areas, essentially are the form that we might find best suited to the COVID environment.

Here are the planned trips outlined in the <u>December 1966</u> issue of the TOOT:

PVS SKI TRIP SCHEDULE

January 13, 14, 15 - to Seven Springs, Pa. This will be a car pool arrangement involving 20 or more people and about a half dozen cars. Make your plans early for this event owing to a need for room reservations. Seven Springs is a million dollar resort center with many recreational facilities, including an indoor swimming pool.

January 21 - see PVS Racing Schedule above.

January 28 - BRSC Slalom Race at Charnita. Car pools.

- February 3, 4, 5, 6 Three day trip to Vermont (Stratton, Killington, Stowe, or wherever there is snow). As now seen, at least four cars and 16 people will make this journey. The trip will be rescheduled for February 10-13 if there are snow problems.
- March 17, 18, 19, 20 Three day bus trip to Stratton Mountain in Vermont. Judging by last year's excellent turn-out for this trip, seats will be at a premium. Make your reservations early.
- April 14, 15, 16, 17 Three day trip to Stowe by car. Details later on car pool arrangements.
- May 19, 20, 21, 22 Bus trip to Mount Washington, New Hampshire. This three day ski trip will take us to Tuckerman's Ravine and the famous Headwall.

Ten years later (<u>November 1975</u>) ski trip offerings were a bit more ambitious, with an annual European one, but still primarily short, drive-to trips:

successful event so sign up early. Call Bill now! Feb 27 - 29 SKI-O-REE at Canaan Valley, West Virginia. PVS coordinator and trip leader is Art Topping (Tel 521-6215). This fun event is truly a worthwhile venture; and somehow always lucks out with local snow (last year, barren hills received six inches of new cover on Friday night of the event!) Call Art and join him in attending this multi-club Blue Ridge Ski Council event.

Yet another noteworthy change in skiing is the cost of lift tickets, as indicated in the following from the November 1969 TOOT:

We learned at the PSF Fall Meeting that the Eastern Council had allocated \$10,000 for the purchase of discount lift tickets. At present tickets for the Camelback lifts are available at a 40% reduction. Tickets are good for any day and valid until used. Larry Pease has a quantity available for PVS members. Any number may be purchased by individual members - as he has only 50 tickets, get your supply A.S.A.P. Additional tickets may be ordered, but at the \$4/price they won't last. Tag Larry at Winetasting or at the meeting.

Mar 76 A second Mt. Sutton, Canada trip. Trip leader - Gerry Deighton. No details yet but will have more in later TOOTS. Mar 11 - 28 The PVS European trip. Trip leader is Bob Wychoff (Tel. 589-5532). See the
